

ST. GERARD MISSION HOUSE

PINE CITY, MINNESOTA

The St. Gerard Mission House, to which we have invited you, is situated five miles to the West of the Village of Pine City, sixty-five miles North of the Twin Cities. Travelers coming by car — either from Duluth or St. Paul — would take Highway 61, turn west at the Village High School and continue to the sign that marks the entrance to our property. A Northern Pacific train leaves St. Paul every weekday morning at eight-forty five. Four Greyhound busses come to Pine City each day from the North and South.

Although the Pokegama Institute — which is now St. Gerard Mission — was purchased by the Redemptorist Fathers in 1944, during the Provincialship of Very Rev. Francis J. Fagen, it was not until April 13th, 1945 that our Religious Monastery was canonically established.

St. Gerard's, as its title indicates — is a Mission House. There is no parish attached to it. All members of the Community devote themselves exclusively to the giving of missions and similar apostolic work.

Situated on the shores of Lake Pokegama, and surrounded on three sides by the Snake River, our thirty acre island property is rightly considered one of the most healthful homes of the Redemptorists in the St. Louis Province.

THE HOME MISSION

Thanks to the encouragement and cooperation of our beloved Bishop, The Most Reverend Thomas A. Welch, D. D. this mission house has become, in the few years of its existence, not only the paradise of the St. Louis Province, but the center of one of the greatest missionary endeavors in the history of Redemptorist labors. The records show that, ever since Father Matt Huber inaugurated the work by giving a Forty Hours at Stillwater, Minnesota, in 1944, the Fathers attached to the St. Gerard Mission House have conducted:

THE SECOND NOVITIATE

The Redemptorist Congregation was established by Saint Alphonsus Liguori for the purpose of conducting missions. To this end our young men are given a Second Novitiate, after they have reached Ordination. During this Novitiate period they are instructed in the art of writing sermons, and trained in the mechanics of conducting a Redemptorist Mission. The chief purpose, however, of this Second Novitiate, is to strengthen the spiritual life of these young men - to heighten their zeal for souls - and to instill into their minds those practical lessons that will enable them to exercise that zeal with patience and charity toward both priests and people.

In 1945 the first class of Novices came to Pine City. Since then 140 young priests have been prepared at St. Gerard's for the public ministry. Some of them are now in the Western Province of Oakland, California. Some are in the Vice-Province of New Orleans, Louisiana. Others are working in the parishes or teaching in the Preparatory College and in the Seminary of our Province of St. Louis, Missouri. Many of them are on

Each Community and each class of Novices have done their share, through the years, in improving and beautifying the property.

THE NEW MISSION HOUSE

This brochure is intended chiefly to draw attention to the latest addition to the St. Gerard Mission House, a new chapel in the Monastery proper. The old chapel has been extended as far as the front porch, and widened to embrace the old sacristy. Half of the porch is now a side chapel, with three altars. The other half, to the North, will be a private parlor. The altar is thus away from the building. An attractive steel spire rises above the cupola. Where before ten men could hardly occupy the chapel, now in the lengthened and widened area thirty can easily be accommodated.

OUR WONDERFUL BENEFACTORS

t is not only proper but imperative that we mention the fact that all these improvements - the new roof and the chapel particularily - are the gift of St. Gerard's most generous benefactor, Mrs. J. This window contains an attractive image of St. Gerard Majella. The window on the Epistle side is the gift of the Doctor Anthony D. Romano Family of Pine City, Minnesota, in memory of their little daughter, Teresa. The window on the Gospel side was donated by Estelle and Beatrice Feick of Detroit, Michigan. The beautiful veil that covered the tabernacle, and was so admired by all, was the gift of Mrs. Edward Nugent of Grand Rapids, Michigan. We are very happy to include the name of Miss Gloria Zoghby of Mobile, Alabama, and thank her for the complete set of tabernacle veils she gave us. The stain-glass windows and the decorated sanctuary are the work of Karl Hackert of Chicago, Illinois.
