



Dear Friends,

Many years ago I wrote my last common letter to family and friends. I do so now to bring you up to date on many events in my life. First and most important is the new telephone area code: 636. Come February, that is all that will work!

The year, 1999, is the first complete year of retirement with no assigned tasks. What a joy to awake and know I need not rush off to a job somewhere. I am doing stuff I like and enjoying it too!

Last summer I finished with the Wound Care Center. The year and a half bout to heal several ulcers on my left leg proved successful. But I still use the pressure pump twice a day on my legs. I do skip when there is a conflict, like gone for the day, etc. The root problem has not gone away, just the ulcers are healed up but, I still need to be careful and watch for injures. The Moon Booting helps with circulation and swelling.

I planed a three segment vacation last fall (late Sept, early Oct) with the first segment ending at the Illinois Railway Museum near Maringo, Illinois for the MEMBERS WEEKEND. I checked in at a local motel Friday night relaxing, checking out the weather on cable which carried Chicago's WGN. The lead story that evening was of an industrial accident, a crane fell into the Chicago river with two men in the basket. Fellow workers dove in and rescued them. One recovered consciousness by the time the ambulance arrived the other did not. The following days Tribune carried it as a front page story. I enjoyed my weekend and left mid afternoon Sunday for my next stop and to have dinner with a fellow Redemptorists in Oconomowoc, Wis. I planed on departing the following morning on the next leg of my trip, Sault Ste Marie, and a train ride on the Algoma Central through Agawa Canyon to Hurst Ontario, Canada.

Upon my arrival in Oconomowoc about 5:30 I was greeted with the announcement that I had an important message. The mangled name had a couple of phone numbers. I recognized one as my sister Carolyn's. It sounded like a death in the family. A phone call reveled it was her son my nephew John Gindl. The how, told of a crane falling into the river – I knew the story – my stunned heart sank.

The next morning, Monday, I canceled the Hurst trip and all reservations that I had made. I headed south to Lynwood, Illinois, near Dyer, Indiana, for the funeral and family. All the nieces and nephews gathered. John's older brothers and sister and their families, Michael from Iowa, Barbara from Palatine (north west of Chicago), David from Colorado, and his younger sister Mary, widowed a year and a half before. My sister Harriett's children were their too, Mary from Wisconsin, Donna from New York, and Jim from Chicago. The funeral parlor was jammed with family and friends including 102 yr old Grandma Gindl. There was a full church for the service. The mile and a half string of cars really tied up traffic on US 30 as the cortege move through Chicago Heights, Ford City, Salk Village, Lynwood, Illinois, to Dyer, Indiana on its way to the cemetery in Schererville, Indiana.

I miss John. His image appears often. He and his wife Jean, and the four children are constantly in my prayers.

Hobby wise I enjoy trains and railroad modeling. Also I manage a train ride or two. The Gateway Model RR club meets monthly. The Illinois Central Historical Society gathered four days in Louisville last October for their annual meet. I have several models in various stages of construction. And I am always willing to check out a train or two! Now if only I had a space for some track. Oh well, can't have everything.

I get out walking the malls and shopping and the like. Of course I visit my sisters and other family and friends. Time seems to go so quickly. I read a lot not only the daily paper and modeling magazines but various books too. Finishing up another best seller by Frank McCourt.

May the good God have you well blessed, and remembering you in my prayers,
