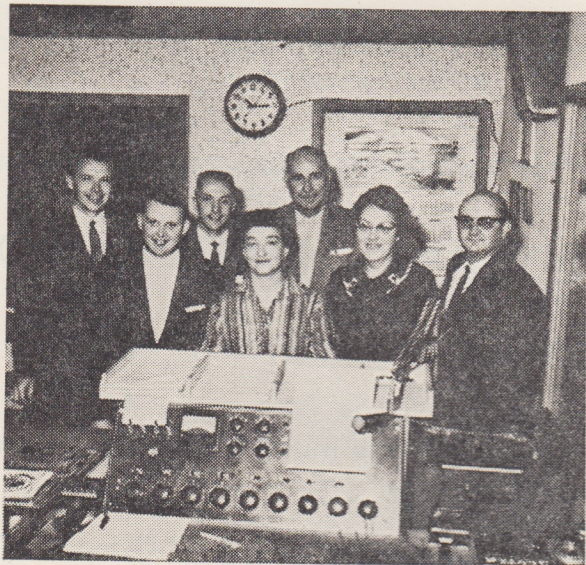

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WCMP FEATURE RADIO

1. Fair will open Friday, July 28 at 9:00 a.m. Friday, July 28 will be entry day only.

2. The Superintendents of the several divisions shall have entire charge of their respective departments.

3. The judges will, in nearly all departments, be experts from the Agricultural College or experts in their line from outside of Pine county.

4. Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves when their livestock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly when called. It is our intention, in so far as possible, to judge these departments during the morning of the second day.

5. Farm products, fruit, flowers, domestic and household goods must be the production of the exhibitors or some member of the family to be entitled to compete for prizes. See Div. I for special rules.

6. Exhibitors are entitled to exhibit any number of articles, but no article can be entered in more than one class, except where noted. An exhibitor may make only one entry in any one lot.

7. The right is reserved to accept or reject any entry offered.

8. Where there is but one exhibitor competing for a premium, the exhibit may receive recognition as first place, or second at the discretion of the judge.

9. Entries for premium may be made to the secretary or superintendents of the various departments, either personally or by letter, but all animals or articles for exhibition, except flowers, must be in the proper department not later than 6 p.m. the first day of the fair. Judging will begin promptly at 9 a. m. the second day, Saturday, July 29.

10. Awards for premiums will be designated by card, sticker, or ribbon as follows: First, blue; Second, red; Third white.

11. Premiums will not be awarded on exhibits that are inferior or are not considered worthy by the judges regardless of lack of competition.

12. The management will provide police protection day or night, and will take every precaution in their power for the protection and preservation of stock and articles on exhibition, but will not be responsible for any loss, damage, disease, sickness, or injury that might occur.

13. All exhibits in the division of Culinary, Dairy Products, Vegetables, Fruit, Flowers, Grains and Seeds must be made, grown, or produced within the current year and owned by the exhibitor unless otherwise specified.

14. All livestock entries must be made before 9 p.m. Friday, July 21. All other entries must

be made before 6 p.m. Monday, July 24. A charge of \$0.50 per exhibit will be made for livestock when advance entry was not made.

15. An entrance fee of \$1.00 will be required from each exhibitor for 1 to 12 entries and 10c for each additional entry, which will entitle the holder to exhibit in any or all divisions from D to I inclusive.

16. Premiums not claimed within sixty days after the close of the fair will be considered forfeited to the society. Errors in premium checks must be reported to the secretary within 15 days of date of check.

17. Premiums will be paid only on those entries made in accordance with the premium list. Items not listed in premium list are not eligible for any premiums.

18. Residents of adjoining counties whose fairs permit exhibitors from Pine county may exhibit here.

19. No changes, additions, or alterations will be permitted after the books are placed in the hands of the judges and all exhibitors must be certain that their entries are entered in the proper class and lot. It will be the duty of the judge to rule out any exhibit not corresponding with the entry list.

20. Inquiries as to terms and applications for space for concessions must be made to the secretary.

21. Entries must not be removed before 7:30 and by 9:00 p.m. on the night of the third day, Sunday, July 30. Exception being livestock and poultry which may be removed from the grounds after 4 p.m. Violation of this will be sufficient grounds for forfeiture of any premiums won thereon.

22. Buildings will not be kept open later than 10 p.m. each night. Doors will not open before 9 a.m. Actual hours will be determined by the management.

23. The Pine County Agricultural Society reserves to its board the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and settle all questions and differences arising therefrom.

LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

No exhibitor of livestock shall be allowed to make more than one entry in any one lot and all members of the same family shall constitute a single exhibitor, except in 4-H department. Each exhibitor must exhibit his own entries or forfeit any premiums earned.

4-H members will not be permitted to exhibit 4-H animals in open class competition.

Exhibitors of livestock may be required by the secretary to make affidavit that such livestock has not been exposed to contagious or

infectious diseases within the last three months in accordance with Livestock Sanitary Board Regulations.

Sires, dams, and groups entered as such must be owned by the individual or firms exhibiting them, but the progeny of animals may be shown simply as proof of their breeding qualities without such ownership.

No entries shall be removed before 4:00 p.m. Sunday afternoon, July 30. Violation of this will be sufficient grounds for forfeiture of any premiums won thereon.

All livestock exhibitors must provide their own grain. Hay will be furnished by the society. The society will furnish bedding and straw.

IMPORTANT NOTICE - Persons intending to exhibit livestock will kindly notify the secretary or the superintendent as to the number of stalls desired. We request this so we may be able to provide ample barn room for everything. Do this at once. No entries taken after July 21.

In classes where registered cattle are called for, all animals over 1 year of age must be presented with Registration papers or Certificates of Transfer issued by the society in which they are eligible for registry. Calves under 1 year of age will be accepted on the statement of the owner as to eligibility for registration.

No exhibitor of livestock shall be allowed to make more than one entry in any one lot.

All cattle must be T.B. and Bang's tested as prescribed by the regulations of the Minnesota Sanitary Board.

All exhibitors of bulls, one year and over, must lead such animals with a suitable staff attached to the nose ring.

To encourage the exhibition of good dairy cattle, prizes are offered on herds of five (any of which may have been entered in any other class are eligible) consisting of one registered bull, 1 year or over; and four females, one 3 years old or over; one 2 years old and under 2; one 1 year old; and one heifer calf under 1 year, but all of one breed.

The registered bull is the greatest factor in building up a herd; the females will be judged as to their capabilities as breeders and in production of butterfat; the latter having the greatest consideration. (It is not necessary for the females to be registered).

DIVISION C — POULTRY

The regulations and rules governing exhibits in this class are as follows:

1 No exhibitor will be permitted to enter more than four breeds of poultry other than turkeys and waterfowl.

2. All stock must be in coops by 6:00 p.m. Friday, July 28.

3. All coops will be furnished free.

4. Premiums will be paid on all fowls listed in the "Standard of Perfection."

5. In order to arrange proper space and coops it will be a favor if all entries are mailed or handed to the superintendent. See, write or phone them to the superintendent before July 21.

6. Entry blanks may be obtained from the superintendent, president, or the secretary.

7. The placing will be made by a competent licensed poultry judge.

8. Feed will be provided.

Any further information regarding the poultry division may be had by seeing or writing the superintendent of the poultry division.

No birds shall be removed before 4 p.m. on Sunday afternoon, the 30th. This rule will be strictly enforced. Penalty for removal prior to the above time will be forfeiture of any premium earned thereon.

BOYS AND GIRLS 4-H CLUB WORK

This department is open to all regularly enrolled 4-H club members. All members are encouraged to exhibit their work. **ENTRIES ARE PERMITTED ONLY IN THE PROJECTS IN WHICH A MEMBER IS ENROLLED.** (One entry per lot and three lots per project unless otherwise stated. Advanced members cannot enter in the beginners section, etc.) Project rules as outlined in the 4-H record blanks will be the basis of awards. Exhibits must have been made, grown by, or cared for by the club member. Some help or advice is encouraged. Entry indicates these rules were followed and any violation will mean forfeiture of prizes and any trips or honors won.

Club members planning to exhibit at the county fair should send their record and story to the County Agent's Office, Hinckley, Minn., before July 10, 1961. All records will be judged and placed into blue, red or white groups, according to the completeness of record-to-date and 4-H judging standards. State trips require that both exhibit and record be of blue ribbon quality. Club members must be at least 12 years of age during the calendar year before they can be eligible for trips to state events. Trips are awarded according to regulations of the State 4-H Club department.

Livestock members must make advance entry with the County Agent, Hinckley, Minn. by July 10, 1961. This will allow sufficient time to have testing done, arrange for transportation from the northern section of the county, and plan for hay and bedding which is provided.

A member having a red record and receiving a blue grade on the project entered will receive a blue ribbon, but red premium money. County, State and National awards are based not only on quality of exhibit, but quality of record and story. Both record and exhibit are considered for final awards. Grand Champions in each Class are awarded a purple ribbon. If exhibitor wins more than one trip to state events, reserve champs are eligible for trips according to state rulings and allotments.

Livestock may be removed from fair grounds starting at 4 p.m. July 30, 1961. Other exhibits may be removed after 7:30 p.m. on July 30, 1961. Livestock members are expected to feed and care for their own animals. Failure to do so will result in cancellation of premium won on that entry. Pre-registration of animals is required. All exhibits must be in place by 3 p.m. July 27, 1961.

The basis of placing by the judges may be better understood by reading the score sheets which have been placed in prominent places

in the 4-H buildings. Any other questions or policies will be answered by the superintendent of this division.
