## Welcome to *The Citizen*

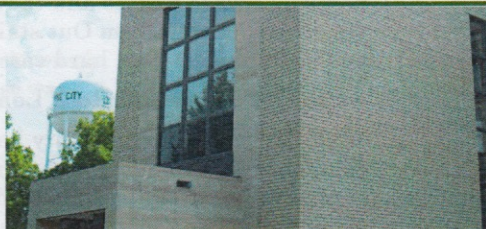

## Weigh in on options for City Hall, CIP: Join a task force

Did you know that the City leases space for City Hall presently? That lease expires in 2018. Do you wish to have input on the future of City Hall? All options are on the table. Should the City build a new City Hall, continue to lease space from Pine County, purchase the Pine Government Center from Pine County, or purchase a portion of the Pine Government Center (such as a common interest community)?

What other options should the City pursue? The City is hoping residents become engaged in these discussions early on and is setting up a task force for interested citizens. The first meeting will be held June 25 beginning at 5 p.m. to work to develop a plan for City Hall offices, considering all alternatives.

Also, the City is looking for people to join a task force to make recommendations to the Council about capital improvement projects (CIP). The first meeting will be held on July 30 beginning at 5 p.m. The task force will review the capital improvement plan and help prioritize the five-year future capital improvement expenses. No need to RSVP for either meeting. Simply come with your ideas. Questions can be directed to City Administrator Holly Wilson at (320) 629-2575, ext. 101.

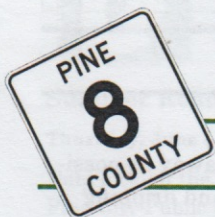

## Community Development News: CSAH 8 Update

County State-Aid Highway (CSAH) 8 is a road that serves Pine City Township and the City of Pine City. The approximately seven-mile (11 km) road begins at the intersection of Ravine Road (CR 117) and St. Croix Road (CR 118), heads west into Pine City on St. Croix Road, then on St. Croix Road SE, heads north on 2nd Street SE, heads west on 3rd Avenue SE, and terminates at Main Street (CR 61).

This year and next, Pine County will be reconstructing CSAH 8 in Pine City (3rd Avenue SE and 2nd Street SE). As part of the improvements, the City of Pine City will be replacing the existing sanitary sewer and water mains in the project area. The City's portion of the improvements will also include the reconstruction of 7th Avenue SE, east of 2nd Street SE, along with sidewalk and curb improvements on 5th Street SE. washed a load of darks first. If you happen to wash whites and they look yellow you can get Iron Out stain remover from your local hardware stores.

### ► Sump Pumps and Roof Leaders

With the wet Spring the City has experienced high volumes of water in the sanitary system. This could be due to sump pumps and roof leaders hooked up directly to the sanitary system.

### ► Dogs

All dogs that live within the city limits of the City of Pine City need to be licensed at City Hall. Bring proof of vaccination when you license them. The city also requires that animals are on a leash if they are not confined to the

owner's property. If you want to see the complete ordinance on Animal Control, see Chapter 5 on the City of Pine City Web site.

Also, if your dog has gone missing, it is a good idea to contact City Hall to see if it could have possibly been impounded.

## Fire Marshal: Grill Safely!

It's that time of year when the grills are stoked for warm-weather barbecues. While that can be a very enjoyable experience, there are also risks involved. Here are some grill safety tips:

### Charcoal Grill Safety Tips

- Never burn charcoal inside of homes, vehicles, tents, or campers.
- Charcoal should never be used indoors, even if ventilation is provided.
- Since charcoal produces carbon mon-

oxide (CO) until the charcoal is completely extinguished, do not store the grill indoors with freshly used coals.

### Gas Grill Safety Tips

- Check the tubes that lead into the burner for any blockage from insects, spiders, or food grease. Use a pipe cleaner or wire to clear blockage and push it through the main part of the burner.
- Check grill hoses for cracking, brittleness, holes and leaks. Make sure there are no sharp bends in the hose

or tubing.

- Move gas hoses as far away as possible from hot surfaces and dripping hot grease. If you can't move the hoses, install a heat shield to protect them.
- Replace scratched or nicked connectors, which can eventually leak gas.
- If you detect a gas leak, immediately turn off the gas at the tank and don't attempt to light the grill until the leak is fixed. **Continued Pg. 3**



## Retirement after 30-plus years

## Grill safety tips (cont.)

- Keep lit cigarettes, matches, or open flames away from leaking grill.
- Never use a grill indoors. Use the grill at least 10 feet away from any building. Do not use the grill in a garage, carport, porch, or under a surface that can catch fire.
- When lighting the grill, keep the top open. If the grill does not light in the first several attempts, wait five minutes to allow gas to dissipate.
- Never attempt to repair the tank valve or the appliance yourself. See an LP gas dealer or a qualified appliance repair person.
- Use caution when storing LP gas containers. Keep containers upright. Never store a spare gas container under or near the grill. Never store a full container indoors. Never store or use flammable liquids near the grill.
- To avoid incidents while transporting LP containers, consumers should transport the container in a secure, upright position. Never keep a filled container in a hot car or car trunk. Heat will cause the gas pressure to increase, causing the relief valve to open and allowing gas to escape.
- CPSC worked with the industry to develop a new voluntary standard to prevent LP gas leaks. Grills meeting this standard will shut themselves off if a gas leak occurs.

## Pine City becomes a GreenStep City



The Pine City City Council committed the City to becoming a GreenStep City, a voluntary, three-year program started by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA).

Zach Borich, a former Pine City High School student, now enrolled at the University of Minnesota-Duluth (UMD), has been helping Pine City achieve the status. At UMD, he is seeking an Environmental Sustainability major, and double minor in Geographic

Information Science and Geography, respectively.

As a GreenStep City, Pine City must implement at least 12 of the MPCA's 28 identified environmental best practices. Categories include: buildings and lighting, transportation, environmental management, economic and community development, and land use. Fortunately, the city didn't start from scratch, as it had already begun implementing some of the best practices before the council even made it official.

"GreenStep best practices will result in multiple benefits for Pine City, and the continuous work with these best practices will help make our city more sus-

tainable," said Borich.

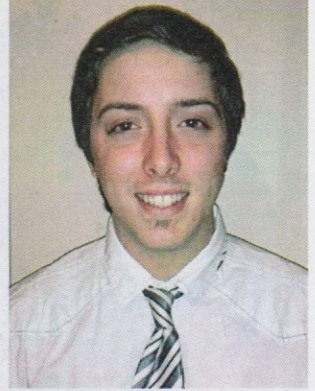

## Chamber Corner: Pine County Fair Parade to be rerouted

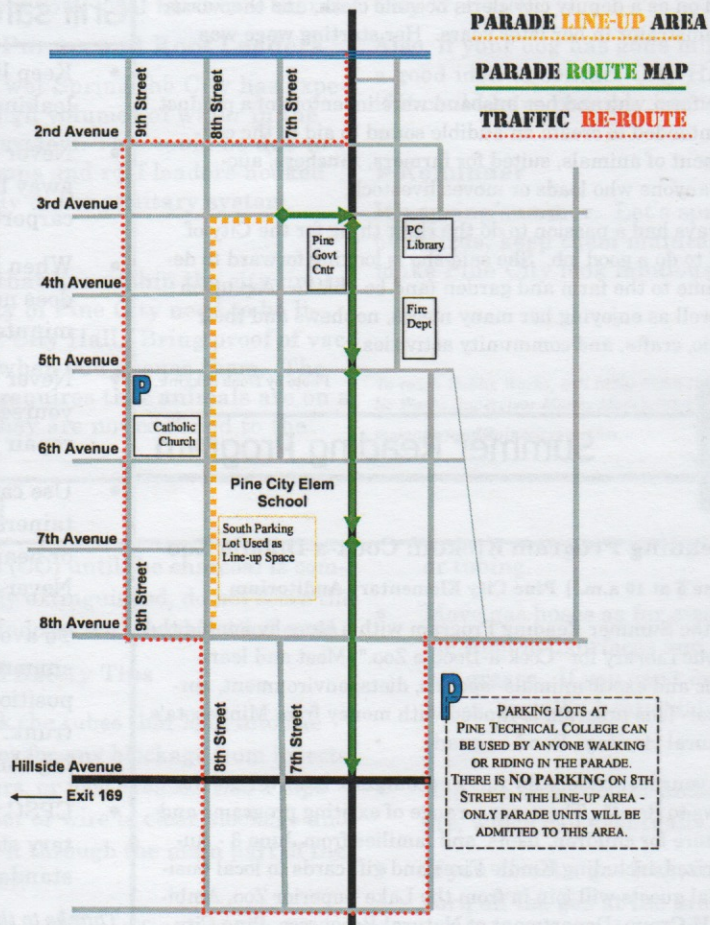


As a part of the County Road 8 project, the Pine County Fair Parade will be re-routed this year, and perhaps next. (Please see more info on the County Road 8 project on Pg. 1).

## Mercury Reduction—It just makes cents!

Reducing source emissions of mercury before it reaches your local wastewater treatment facility is the easiest way to reduce mercury impacts on your community. Participate and take charge of environmental stewardship in your community by being an active participant in mercury reduction, and by encouraging you friends and family in the community to also be a responsible water user.

Reducing your dependence on technologies that require mercury can greatly help reduce accidental discharge of mercury into your wastewater treatment system. Be an aware consumer and look out for:

### ► Batteries

Many alkaline batteries have already moved away from using mercury, and many states have banned mercury-containing batteries. Ensure your alkaline batteries are mercury-

free, and always dispose of your batteries at recycling facilities or battery recycling drop locations.

### ► Fluorescent Light Bulbs

Mercury is an excellent conductor, and is an essential component in many fluorescent light bulbs. Minnesota regulates the disposal of fluorescent light bulbs, so it is important to responsibly dispose of your waste bulbs. Care should be taken in cleaning up broken bulbs, and remember to never rinse the contents of your bulbs down the drain.

### ► House Paint

Historically mercury was used as red and orange pigments, as well as to prevent mildew accumulation on latex paints. Both of these uses have been discontinued in the United States, but paint manufactured prior to 1990 may still contain mercury. Properly

dispose of all waste paints at disposal and recycling facilities, and never pour excess paint down your drains.

Mercury is a particularly heavy substance and can easily settle in the bottom of pipes and in drain traps. Once there it can contaminate wastewater for many years. Responsibly using and disposing of mercury containing items can prevent many years of expensive clean-up in the future. We hope that you will take this opportunity to become part of the mercury solution in your community.

## Pine Technical College opens Pine Innovation Center



Compelled by what's been erected along the main drag through town?

Pine City has a new business incubator and it's location is superb at the corner of the busiest two cross streets in Pine City, Main Street and County Road 7 (Hillside Avenue).

According to a fact sheet put out by Pine Technical College, business incubators are meant to nurture the development of entrepreneurial companies,

helping them survive and grow during the start-up and expansion periods, when they are most vulnerable. These programs provide their client companies with business support services and resources tailored to young and growing firms. The most common goals of incubation programs are creating jobs in a community, enhancing a community's entrepreneurial climate, retaining businesses in a community, building or accelerating growth in a local industry,

and diversifying local economies.

Incubators are a combination of a physical facility and the services provided. Often the rent is reduced for the first one-to-three years of occupancy for a business locating in the incubator, and the services initially are either free or at a reduced price.

There are over 1,400 incubators in North America, and the strategy originated in the late 1970s.

Work on the newest study for transit-way improvements in the Rush Line Corridor is underway.

Two open houses are scheduled to seek input from community members and businesses on the transit needs of the corridor and the proposed routes:

- Interstate 35E/35 from Union Depot in downtown St. Paul to Forest Lake.
- On the Ramsey County Regional Rail Authority (RCRRA) right-of-way from Union Depot to White Bear Lake.

Open houses are drop-in with no formal presentation. Project staff will be available to answer questions.

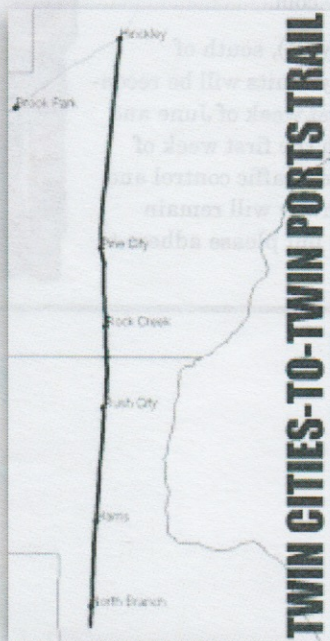

The Rush Line Corridor is a transit-way corridor extending 80 miles from Hinckley to Union Depot in downtown St. Paul. The Pre-Project Development (PPD) Study builds upon previous work and is focused on analyzing bus and rail alternatives between Forest Lake and Union Depot.

The study will identify one mode and one alignment for adoption as the corridor's Locally Preferred Alternative (LPA). The PPD Study is a joint local and regional planning effort conducted by the Rush Line Corridor Task Force and led by the Ramsey County Regional Railroad Authority.



## Twin Cities-to-Twin Ports Trail Project Resumes

Does the nicer weather have you anxious to get outdoors, biking or walking?

Pine City will soon have a wonderful new trail resource in a portion of what's dubbed the "Twin Cities-to-Twin Ports Trail", which will eventually connect the Twin Cities area with Duluth.

Trail progress and coordination meetings resumed on Thursday, May 15. The project is expected to be completed by mid-July and ready for use by the public in August.

The remainder of May, the contractors will continue excavation, and begin work on a retaining wall, curb and gutter and some paving. Seed and mulch work will begin in mid-June as well as the base course and wear course on the paving. Johnson Street SE is expected to be paved in mid-June as well.

- ◆ The "Open Forum for Citizen Input" is an opportunity for citizens to present an issue or concern to the City Council that is not on the agenda for a regular meeting. Anyone is welcome to attend Council meetings and participate in the open forum.
- ◆ The City recently adopted a new Parks Use Policy, available on the City's Web site. Parks now require reservations for event use.
