

never-tiring person, he was ever ready to help the neighboring churches and communities, and never too busy to call on those who were sick or in trouble.

After four years Rev. W. K. Gray, who will be remembered for his Evangelistic sermons and the inspiring prayer meeting services, came to serve this pastorate for two years. His son, George, entered the ministry in 1912.

Rev. H. H. Parish, son of Rev. J. J. Parish, came to finish the year and remained for five years when he decided to go into temperance work in Minnesota. He later became a national executive of Temperance Education, Inc. He retired some three years ago and passed away in November, 1961.

There was no parsonage until 1911 when the building located on the corner of what is now 5th Avenue West and 7th Street was purchased. Rev. H. H. Parish and wife were the first to occupy it.

During the three-year pastorate of Rev. H. H. Hare, who came in 1915, many improvements were made in the church such as redecorating, purchasing new pulpit furniture, chairs and installing new light fixtures. Rev. Hare was a good soloist and worked with the choir.

The minutes do not record all the things that were done through these years, but all the officers of the various organizations and the faithful teachers were carrying on with scarcely a break and always with the aim of higher levels of spiritual and social life for our town.

Rev. W. E. Young and family followed Rev. Hare and served the church for two years as did Rev. James Orrock, who was followed by Rev. John Lowe who came in 1922. During Rev. Lowe's four-year pastorate subscriptions were taken to build a new church. A Dr. Kester was holding \$1,000 in his bank for us from the Rush City church property and if we would raise \$1,800 he would give us \$250 more. Wishing to avail ourselves of this offer, steps were taken at once to secure subscriptions. With \$334 in the treasury, a possible \$100 available from the Ladies' Aid, several other good subscriptions were promised.

The building committee appointed was C. H. Beechel, G. R. Christopher, Elmer Carrier and A. P. Norton, who were to submit plans to the finance committee consisting of Messrs. P. L. Hamlin,

J. H. Woehrle, R. Gray, A. W. Piper and Rev. John Lowe The architect was Mr. W. L. Alban of St. Paul.

By February 1926 it was reported that about \$9,000 had been raised or subscribed for. The building was started in the spring of 1927, the old building torn down and the material used in the new construction. Services again were held in the town hall with Rev. T. B. Clark as pastor. He came in October 1926 to serve the church. On August 14, 1927 the new church was ready for dedication. Bishop Charles E. Locke, District Superintendent, F. W. Harron and Roy L. Smith were the principal speakers. It was a very happy occasion for all those who had a part in this achievement. It's impossible to give special praise to everyone but the church stands today, 35 years later, as mute evidence that all worked in the interest of the Kingdom of God. During Rev. Clark's stay here Mrs. Clark will be remembered as being a concert violinist.

Evangelist George L. Barker, who earlier held very impressive meetings here, passed away at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Richardson Gray where he spent his last two years. Rev. Lorenzo Johnson came in 1929 to stay for five years. Mrs. Johnson did very good work with the children in Junior League and Sunday School. Rev. John L. Parish, also a son of the late Rev. J. J. Parish, came in 1934 to serve as pastor for two years. Mrs. Parish was a faithful member of the choir. At about this time Mrs. Ethel Gray relieved Mr. Knute Sandberg as head of the Home Department of the church. She has been a faithful worker through all these years making as many as 1,000 calls a year and is still carrying on. Rev. L. D. McGladrey and family, who came from Mora in 1936, worked with us for three years.

In the spring of 1937 the church was seated with chairs, a project encouraged by Mr. Boyle, his last work for the church. This same year the church celebrated its 50th Anniversary and the 10th Anniversary of the new church. Another happy occasion to be remembered. During Rev. McGladrey's ministry some of the members put on a home talent play to raise money to buy the choir robes which are still in use.

Rev. Donald J. Lathrop came in August, 1939, to finish out the year of Rev. Peter Burleigh who left for the west. Before Rev. Lathrop and wife left for Moose Lake in 1941 they saw the mortgage paid off by generous friends of the church. He was followed by Rev. George L. Lutz who after two years left for the Chaplaincy in the Army. His wife and children remained for a while to work with the Rock Creek and West Rock churches before leaving for California to make their home there. Mrs. Lutz, a soloist, also organized a Junior or Children's Choir, leaving her directorship to Mrs. James Engel. Later Mrs. William Wilson, also a soloist, took charge of the Junior Choir.

The appointment of Richard Blake as music instructor in the Pine City High School brought his parents, the Rev. Charles Blakes, to serve the church. Although retired he was very busy and well liked by everyone. During his stay here the church was beautifully decorated at a cost of \$1,400. A coal stoker was installed, made possible by C. H. Beechel and A. W. Piper. In June, 1945, the Blakes moved to Aitkin.

From June to September the pulpit was filled with laymen and pastors from various other places. Then Dr. Paul L. Snyder, District Superintendent, sent Pastor John R. Miller to serve Pine City as a station appointment and he remained for seven years.

In 1946 Mrs. Marilla Gottry's unusual term of nearly sixty years of service as secretary of the official board was recognized by the congregation. She was presented with a purse of \$160 to take a trip west. She kept up her good work for another five years.

On May 5, 1947, the new Wurlitzer Organ, the new pews and communion table arrived to add beauty and service to the interior of the church. The organ came as a gift from A. W. Piper as a memorial for his wife, Minnie. The pews have all been paid for as a memorial for some loved one as have most of the stained glass windows.

In March, 1949, the first pledge of \$100 for the new parsonage was made by Richard Downing. On July 5, a ground breaking ceremony took place when Mrs. Marilla Gottry and A. W. Piper, the oldest members of the church, and Jimmy Miller, son of the pastor, the youngest, turned over the first shovelful of dirt. On December 5, the Miller family moved into the new parsonage and held open house for members and friends on January 1, 1950. In June, 1952 the Miller family was moved to Montevideo.

During the next seven years much improving was done. A new concrete sidewalk was laid along the church property, the church re-roofed, the building insulated, the heating system revamped, the brick facing repaired, a new tile floor laid in Friendship Hall, some redecorating done and a new Propane gas furnace installed. Much of the expense of these improvements was met by a building and improvement fund of about \$4,500 left by the A. W. Piper estate. There were many other minor improvements not mentioned but appreciated just as much.

Rev. James E. Dowler and family served the church from 1952 to 1956 when much of this work was being done. Mrs. Dowler did a lot of good influential work among the young folks. She also occasionally filled the pulpit at one or the other of the three churches that are included in the Pine City charge namely, Pine City, Brook Park and Pokegama.

In July, 1956, the Rev. D. Price Lackey family came from Kansas to the Pine City charge. After two and a half years they moved to Harmony to take up the work there. Mr. Bruce Erikson, a student from Duluth, came to fill out the year. He, with his new bride did a wonderful work while here. Rev. Robert Moore came in June, 1959 to serve the church for two years when he was sent to Hibbing to assist the minister there and work with the young people as counselor.

In the summer of 1960 the new double garage was built.

The cost was partially covered by a bequest in Mrs. Daisy Carrier's will designated for that purpose. The congregation was grateful

to student Loren Grage and his wife, Connie, for carrying on from June, 1961 to October when our present pastor, Rev. Clair R. Kess and family came from Montevideo to take charge. Mrs. Kess directs the choir and is very active in other work of the church.

Since the first of this year the redecorating of the entire sanctuary has been done. During this six weeks project the floors were sanded and refinished and the walls and ceilings painted. Some work was done on the stairs and the basement.

This work was done by volunteer labor and donations came in from the members and friends to pay for materials.

Much could be said about all the different members who over the years devoted a lot of time and money without recognition but with a source of satisfaction to themselves for having had a part in the work for the Lord and community.

Mention must be made that the pictures hanging in the church were handpainted by the late Richardson Gray who was a layleader of the church and a faithful worker in the Sunday School and with the young people since 1908. In years of service, Mrs. Elma Gottry deserves recognition for having been organist and pianist most of the time since 1911. She still plays occasionally in the absence of

the present organist, Mrs. James Engel, who also deserves commendation.

As our present District Superintendent, Dr. Edward Martin, told us in his sermon of August 5th, "we must carry on Christ's work — do the duties of today and look towards the possibilities of tomorrow." The most recent "duty" or improvement necessary at this time was the rewiring of the church, the first phase of which was done July, 1962. A new fuse box, meters and heavy wiring have been put in to take care of the

areas of the church most urgently in need of rewiring such as the kitchen, wiring to the organ, etc. Rewiring of the main sanctuary will be done at a later date.

The official board designated the following Memorials to which members and friends may donate in memory of loved ones: new organ, church equipment, church furniture and building developments.

Still looking into the future, we are purchasing the John Gray property adjoining the south side of the church. As we expect to grow and expand in the coming years, this additional property will be a great asset to our church plant.
