



SPORTS

P.C. 48 Siren 38

Pine City scored their chird win of the season by drubbing Siren Wisconsin 48-38 behind the play of Jerry Yost and Busch Sommer, who scored 29 of the Dragon's 48 points. The green of Pine City allowed Siren only six field goals while dropping 17 of their own. Free throws kept Siren in the game when they meshed 26 of 37 charity tosses for 70%.

Jerry Yost led Pine City scoring with 17 points. He was followed by his running mate at guard, Butch Sommer with 12.

N.B. 62 P.C. 38

The North Branch Vikings, coupling a hot first quarter led by Delmer Fairbanks' 14 and near--faultless points floor play, defeated the Dragons on the home floor last Friday, 62-38. Dragons played their worst offensive game of the new season, connecting on only 13 of 70 field goal attempts for a percentage of .185, .125 below average. At the i'ree throw line, P.C. hit 10 of 19 for about 50% and N.B. 14 of 23 for approximately
