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## FOURTH OF JULY.

Pine City Will Celebrate the National Holiday With a Grand, Patriotic Outburst.

In Spite of Fire and Flood We Are Still on Earth, and Intend to Let Everyone Know It.

A meeting was held by the business men of this place on last Monday evening, to see what could be done towards celebrating the Fourth of July in an appropriate manner.

The meeting was called to order by President of the Council J. Y. Beckenridge, who was elected chairman, and S. G. L. Roberts secretary.

On motion of L. A. Collins, the chairman instructed to appoint an executive committee, with himself as chairman, to make all necessary arrangements for having a grand and glorious Fourth of July.

No further business appearing the meeting adjourned. The executive committee held a meeting after the adjournment of the business men's meeting, and appointed the following officers to take charge of the celebration: Chairman, J. Y. Beckenridge; secretary, S. G. L. Roberts; treasurer, Otto Kowalek.

A committee of five was appointed to see what could be done in raising subscription for a collection, consisting of L. A. Collins, J. D. Vaughan, L. H. McKusick, J. P. Stowe, and Geo. Perkins.

A committee of arrangements was then appointed, J. Y. Beckenridge, J. H. Harley, D. Greeley, P. W. McAllen and J. Adam Bole composed such committee.

## WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20, 1898.

No person in Washington ready to believe that Gen. Shafter's army was on Cuban soil with more pleasure than did President McKinley. It is not large army, but it is large enough to accomplish the purpose for which it was sent; the men are splendidly equipped and are eager to distinguish themselves. It will require several days for Gen. Shafter to take up a position from which aggressive operations against Santiago can be started, but it is confidently expected that news of a crushing and decisive blow being administered to the Spaniards will be received during the present week.

There isn't the slightest doubt in any quarter that Shafter will give the Spaniards a drubbing that they will remember as long as he can get at them.

While neither the President nor any of his advisers believe that the Spanish fleet which left Cadix several days ago will have to come to Cuban waters, its starting will hasten the capture of Porto Rico. No chances are to be taken if that Spanish fleet should cross the Atlantic it will naturally endeavor to make Porto Rico its base of operations, but unless something now unforeseen shall prevent the carrying out of present plans, Porto Rico will be in our possession before the Spanish fleet can possibly arrive there. In this connection it may be well to state that the steamship companies which carry vessels suitable for the transport of troops are responsible for any delay that may occur. They are placing big bets with the government to receive to charter their vessels to carry troops because they wish to sell them to the government at fancy prices. The government, of course, impresses the vessels, leaving the compensation of their owners to be settled hereafter, but up to this time the President had not been disposed to resort to this method of obtaining ships, but it may yet become necessary to do so.

The worst fear the adoption of the joint resolution for the annexation of Hawaii, which went through the House last week by more than a two-thirds vote, is now on in the Senate. How long it will last depends largely upon the endurance of the Senators—less than thirty in number—who have started out, not to defeat the resolution by a direct vote, but to prevent a vote at this session of Congress. There can be but one end to a vote and the adoption of the resolution. The Senate could not do so without a two-thirds vote, and a majority of the members present is 55 to 30. No adjournment can take place without the consent of the House, and the votes of 200 Representatives for the annexation of Hawaii was a notice served on the Senate that adjournment without action could never be consented to by the House. In order to make the work of the anti-annexationists, it has been decided that the House will adjourn until the middle of July.

Altogether the subscription for the white bonds to be loaned are all ready to go, and in excess of the amount of the first issue—\$200,000,000—one million to three-quarters of them at a premium of 10 per cent—there is no room for any small investor to subscribe for the subscription for that that has been set out for the bonds. The first who desire \$200,000,000 will not be first, and it will take half of the \$200,000,000 to absorb the entire issue. For any of your readers who desire to contribute to the first issue, they may forward their subscription to the office of the United States Treasury, or to any of the banks in the city.

One thing is certain, will leave the Treasury to March this week, and will be accompanied by Gen. Shafter. It is not probable that any more operations will be carried out on the ships that carried the first troops to Cuba, as there are no more ships to be laid on the Pacific.

It is believed that the first Philippine expedition has arrived at Manila. As soon as official news of its arrival is received President McKinley intends to issue a proclamation declaring the establishment of a military government over the Philippine Islands. Not the slightest apprehension exists in Washington concerning the attitude of Germany towards our occupation of the Philippines, notwithstanding persistent reiterated in cable news of hostile intention on the part of Germany.

There is not the slightest foundation for the sensational story telegraphed from Washington of friction between Gen. Miles and Secretary Alger on account of the conduct of the war. Gen. Miles returned to Washington because that was his intention from the first, and because President McKinley and Secretary Alger wished to consult with him and they are working together harmoniously, as they have been from the beginning of the war. Gen. Miles is now arranging the final plans for the invasion of Porto Rico, of which he has decided to take personal command.

Fire Lobbies Meet.

Chief Judge, of the Pine City Fire Department, called a special meeting of the department on Monday night, and in a very able speech tendered his resignation as chief of the department, giving as reasons that he would not be here for six or eight weeks, and that when he was here he lived too far away from the business portion of the village. Upon motion it was carried that Chief Judge's resignation be laid on the table for one year.

The constitution and by-laws of the Hinckley Fire company were read section by section, and corrections and changes made to suit the department, when it was adopted as read and amended.

A committee consisting of the chief, captain, secretary and S. G. L. Roberts was appointed to prepare a copy of the constitution and by-laws, a list of the names of the officers, and a roster of those wishing to join the department, and submit them to the village council for their ratification and approval.

No further business appearing, the meeting adjourned to meet on Tuesday evening, July 5th, that being the next regular meeting night.
