## McKUSICK FOR THE SENATE.

J. C. POPE, of Mora, and S. C. Johnson, of Rush City, for the House.

At 1 o'clock on Saturday afternoon last, pursuant to call, the Thirty-second Legislative Convention was called to order in Fremans Hall, Rush City, by Chairman J. Y. Beckwith. Chas. Andrews, of Linstrom, was chosen temporary chairman, and Howard Folsom, of Sandstone, temporary secretary. The Committee on Resolutions, Organization and Credentials was then appointed, and a recess of ten minutes was taken for the committees to confer. At the expiration of the time the three committees reported. The committee on Credentials reported Chicago county entitled to 62 delegates, Pine to 40 delegates, and Keweenaw to 15 delegates.

The committee on Organization reported that they would recommend that the temporary organization be made permanent, which was done. The Committee on Resolutions then reported and offered the following:

We, Republicans of the Thirty-second Senatorial District, in convention assembled for the purpose of nominating a Senator and two Representatives for said senatorial district, then our allegiance to the principles of the Republican party, as announced in their last State and National conventions, and fully indorse the nominations made at our last State Convention.

The American people today recognize the patriotism and wisdom of the administration of President McKinley, in the management of the war that has and will be now so speedily and gloriously terminated. We congratulate the people of the state of Minnesota upon its representation in the Congress of the United States. We recognize the ability of our Senators, Hon. Cushman K. Davis and Hon. Knute Nelson, and fully indorse their actions in the Senate of the United States, and pledge to them our most hearty support in their present duties, and heartily recommend that they may be retained in their responsible positions which they have so honorably filled.

We indorse the record of our representative from this district, Hon. E. C. Stevens, and pledge to him our hearty support for his reelection.

At 10 A. M. J. ANDERSON, ANGELO GUNN, F. H. STOLBERG, D. J. MALLON, J. E. GEMMEL, J. S. OLSON, R. M. FOLEY.

J. Adam Bede rose and in a few well-chosen remarks nominated L. H. McKusick for the Senate, Augustus Anderson seconding the nomination. It was then moved that the nomination be made unanimous, and a rising vote was called. Mack was then called upon, and in a few well-chosen remarks thanked the convention for the nomination.

F. H. Stolberg then nominated J. C. Pope of Mora, to represent us in the house, which was seconded by J. C. Morrison of Mora. His nomination was also made unanimous. Mr. Pope then addressed the convention, pledging his good faith to his constituents.

Chas. Knappist then in a few remarks placed in nomination S. C. Johnson, of Rush City, and like the ones before him, he was the unanimous choice of the convention. Sam came to the front and expressed his thanks for the nomination.
