VOICE OF BALLOTS!

Van Sant Re-elected Governor of Minnesota by an Exceedingly Large Majority.

The Contest Between Fletcher and Lind for Congress so Close as to Be Doubtful.

Republicans are Generally Successful Throughout the Eastern and Western States.

Minnesota. Minnesota, Nov. 3.—At 4:30 o'clock this morning sixty-four districts showed that Lind had polled 1,224 votes to 1,856 for Fletcher.

Minnesota, Nov. 3.—The republicans of Minnesota have elected their state ticket by a plurality amounting as high as 53,000 in the case of Van Sant. Late last night Chairman Dues, of the republican state committee was unwilling to connect anything with the election of Van Sant and old anti-federalist.

The legislature will convene in both branches on Wednesday. The republican caucus has elected a large majority of the first, second, third, fourth, seventh and ninth as surely as the republican caucus elected the eighth. Very little has come in from the sixth. It is generally believed that Buckman (republican) is running behind his chief interest, and returns from the contest between Lind and Fletcher have been watched for with anxiety.

Practical Forestry for Minnesota. The Minnesota legislature of 1909 treated a forestry board of nine members to select a survey and to manage any lands which the state may acquire by gift or purchase for forestry purposes.

The first lands which the state has acquired under the act are 1,000 acres of pine land in Cass county which were donated by the late ex-Governor John C. Pillsbury.

In June last the board employed a survey and selected four assistants—all of whom had received scientific forestry training at the Minnesota Experiment Station.

Her home has been in Pine City since its first settlement, her family growing up to manhood and womanhood by her side. She was respected by all who knew her and loved by her own as only a kind mother and loving friend could be. Death came to summon her soul to a better land. She was resigned to her fate and was what one might call a equal sufferer for many years having borne her pain uncomplainingly, until at last when her strength gave way she finally succumbed to the disease. During her illness her husband and all, did all in their power to alleviate the sufferings of her whom they loved so well.

A large family of children,—P. Connor, Mike, Mary, Mrs. McLaughlin, Will, James, Thomas, John, one brother, Patrick Connor, and Mrs. Charles Heywood, a sister, are left to mourn her death.

She has gone to join her husband who preceded her 13 years ago last August.

The funeral took place as stated in last week's Pioneer.


