Morgan Sheehy has withdrawn from the race for Sheriff which leaves but two, viz: James McLaughlin and Geo. W. Booth.

As we go to press Mrs. M. Bregg is laying apparently at death's door from consumption, from which disease she has been suffering for a number of years.

Rev. Father O'Reilly left this week for St. Cloud after having spent a number of weeks in town the guest of Jas. Hurley's family, and other former parishioners.



STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

MRS. JOHN LIND IS GENUINE HEROINE

SAVES TWO MEXICAN LEGISLATORS FROM HUERTA'S MEN.

HID THEM IN HER STATEROOM

While Troops Patrol Ship Two Refugees Stay in Hiding in Her Stateroom and Succeed in Escaping Detection.

New York, Nov. 2.—Mrs. John Lind, wife of the special ambassador to Mexico, arrived here on the steamer Morro Castle in the role of a genuine heroine.

Mrs. Lind brought two Mexican legislators, who owe their liberty, it is thought, to her quick wit and good fortune. To save the two Mexicans from arrest at Vera Cruz, Mrs. Lind hid them in her stateroom and sat up all night on deck until the boat left port and the officers of the Huerta government had gone ashore.

Huerta Detained Vessel.

A week ago the cables brought word that the Ward liner, Morro Castle, had been detained at Vera Cruz while Huerta's agents searched for eight rebellious members of the legislature of the state of Vera Cruz. Until the Morro Castle arrived here only those aboard knew that two of the eight "deputies" had escaped arrest. These two, Adolfo Dominguez and Miguel A. Cordera, say they will stay in New York until Mexico becomes a safer home for the opponents of Huerta.

Mrs. Lind said her husband had expected to return home after the Mexican election. Now she did not know when he would come.

Mrs. Lind said she expected that she would sail from Vera Cruz, said Mrs. Lind, at 4 o'clock on the afternoon of Oct. 23. Then Captain Hart was subpoenaed to testify regarding the flight of Dr. Francisco Vasquez Gomez, who had sailed on the Morro Castle five months ago.

Mrs. Lind said she learned that the real reason for her detention was that the government wished to search the ship for eight state legislators from the city of Jalapa, but they did not find the others, and she told them why.

"While the search was going on the friends of these two men learned that I was on board and they came with tears in their eyes, begging me to help them. I said: 'Here's the key to my stateroom. I will let you in.'"

"I spent the night on deck and the two men hid in my room until the detectives gave up the search and went ashore. The ship was released and we sailed at 5 o'clock the next morning."

The wife of the special envoy is a homely little woman with quiet manners and a low voice, but her eyes flashed as she asserted:

"I could not bear to think of those men being taken away and hanging. I just had to do something for them."

Americans Have Experience.

Two other Americans aboard the Morro Castle, George W. Hebron and John Kane, employees of the American Smelting & Refining company, also had an experience with Dominguez and Cordera. These two men, who Huerta's agents stayed aboard until the ship reached Progreso, on the afternoon of Oct. 25. The first night out of Vera Cruz, Mr. Hebron said, Dominguez burst into their stateroom yelling in Spanish: "They're after me! They're after me!"

Hebron ran on deck and into the arms of a squad of Mexican soldiers.

"Are you an American," they demanded. Hebron said he was and they made no attempt to detain him.

"When I returned to my stateroom," the American said, "I found Dominguez inside with the door barred."

The soldiers left the ship at Progreso.


Washington-Crosby Embassier Found.

CHOLERA "CURE" IS SEIZED

Faker is Forced to Refund Cash and Quit Town of Nicollet When Arrested.

St. Peter.—After he had done a thriving business selling a hog cholera cure to farmers residing near Nicollet village, a stranger giving the name of John Welch was arrested by the village marshal.

The officer confiscated what remained of his remedy and took it to a druggist for analysis. It proved to contain nothing more than soft water, kerosene and bluing.

Circulars have been issued by the extension division of the University of Minnesota warning farmers against the purchase of fake remedies for hog cholera, but this is the first arrest that has been made in this vicinity.

When arraigned before a justice Welch pleaded guilty. Later he refunded the money he had secured from his sales and was ordered out of town.

Minnesota.—A dozen policemen, several detectives and a squad of five men fought a battle royal with a mob of 500 university students, high school boys and their sympathizers at the Gayety theatre Thursday. Clubs were washed their revolvers when the mob came after two young men, said to be ring leaders, were being dragged toward the patrol wagon.

The students, several hundred strong, had seen the university football team on its way to Madison, and then started in a body toward the theatre. They attempted to force their way toward the front entrance, but there theatre employees and Detective Hardin fought them back.

There were many that went to their homes with swollen heads where police clubs had fallen, and there were also several hatless students.

Prisoners Remove Tier of Bricks.

Langdon.—Removal of the worst prisoners in the Cavalier county jail had succeeded in removing one tier of bricks before their efforts at escape were discovered. The prisoners in number, were allowed the freedom of the corridor for an evening and they attempted to take advantage of the opportunity to attempt an escape. The prisoners included Matt Holm, charged with wife murder, and several grand larceny and highway robbery suspects.

Legs Cut Off; Will Recover.

Grand Rapids.—Kenneth Palon, the 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Abe Palon of Grand Rapids, who had both legs amputated by being run over by a Great Northern train two days ago will recover.

Hotel Fire Paralyzes Traffic.

Duluth.—A fire in the 15c change hotel temporarily paralyzed traffic on Superior street, the main thoroughfare, while the firemen fought at the stations in the city fought a stubborn blaze that originated from an overloaded furnace pipe. Ten or more men, who were asleep when the alarm was turned in, were forced to flee the place in great haste and complete confusion. The fire was extinguished by the presence of hundreds of persons. After an hour's fight the blaze was under control.

WOULD SAVE STATE \$3,500,000 YEARLY

J. O. A. PREUS, STATE INSURANCE COMMISSIONER, GIVES SOME SIGNIFICANT FIGURES.

SEEKS FIRE PREVENTION AID

Says If People Were Properly Aroused Much Good Would Result—State Officials to Confer in New York City Relative to Rates.

St. Paul.—The average per capita fire loss in the state of Minnesota for the past ten years has been \$2.92. The average per capita loss in the leading European countries is 33 cents, or approximately one-sixth the loss in this state. These are interesting figures with which State Insurance Commissioner J. O. A. Preus prefaced a scheme for saving the people nearly \$3,500,000 annually.

Losses Might Be Reduced.

"The losses in Minnesota could, if proper action were taken, be reduced to the European figure," declared Mr. Preus. "If this were done," he continued, "our losses in insured homes would be \$708,337, instead of \$4,045,598. In other words, premiums paid on such a basis might have been \$6,028,486 instead of \$3,920,477; that is, a saving of \$2,339,211. Nothing like a catastrophe in any one year could alter these figures and cause a greater loss, if the question of fire prevention were properly treated."

As to Fire Prevention.

Speaking of the importance of fire prevention provisions, Mr. Preus said, in part: "The general public should be aroused to the situation which prevails in this state. There should be a concerted action in order that our people may be relieved from the tremendous fire loss which they are at present forced to bear. It is argued that it is not the function of the fire insurance companies to prevent fires, but their duty is simply to equalize the misfortunes to the public. In 1912 companies carrying approximately 90 per cent of the fire insurance of the country received \$20,000,000 in premiums and expended but six millions, or 27 per cent for fire prevention purposes. Their expenses during the same year amounted to \$120,000,000."

As pointed out by Mr. Preus, the people of the state are not expected to become interested in the question of reducing the fire losses until they can be shown that a direct financial gain to them will result.


