Calendar
Melts Fast
The Trial of Jury Cases Will Probably Be Concluded This Week

The labors of the petit jurors are rapidly drawing to a close and they will probably all be happily headed homeward sometime late tomorrow. The calendar, while long in the total number of cases was short in jury cases—only three remaining on the civil calendar and one on the criminal in the last analysis.

Court opened Tuesday noon with Judge Richard T. Daly of Renville on the bench, owing to Judge Stolberg's present illness.

All the jurors, previously named in The Poker, are present except Albert Franta of Pine town who is 74 years of age and unable to understand the language thoroughly—and was consequently excused. Also, Vincent Selsky of Windemere is not present as he has been absent in North Dakota since before the summonses were issued.

The first case was the claim of Joseph Berard against the G. N. Ry. company for damage for injuries sustained by him when he was "stealing" a ride and was attacked by a brakeman who put him off at Nickerson. When he was put on the stand, however, he failed to remember whether the brakeman hit him over the head or how he was struck and the court forthwith directed a verdict of the defendant.

The case promised to be a long one as there was a formidable array of witnesses present, but took only a few hours of the court's time.

The next case was that of Oscar W. Johnson of Superior against Sinclair & Hogan of Belden to recover damages on an alleged contract for the manufacture of one million feet of lumber at the plaintiff's mill at Belden. Defendants allege that the contract covered only whatever logs they were able to provide—in this case 300,000 feet. The case is being fought by Atty. Andrew Nelson of Superior for plaintiff and J. N. Searles of Stillwater and County Atty. Ervin for defendant. It was before the court all day yesterday and had not been finished up to this noon.

This afternoon it is expected that a case to recover \$300 deposited by a potato buyer on a car of potatoes shipped from Hinckley last spring, which are alleged to have been spoiled when received, will be on. It will probably be finished by night.

Tomorrow morning the trial of John Pused of Denham will probably be taken up. It will be a rather long case as many of the witnesses are unable to speak English and an interpreter will be necessary. However the county authorities look to see its finish before the day's end.

The trial of court cases will be taken up next week, the Pine City dam cases coming on first on Monday. At first it was expected they would be bench-tried but we understand that this arrangement will not be carried out. However, probably not more than two or three of the entire number will be tried. James Manahan will try the cases for the plaintiffs and J. N. Searles of Stillwater and S. G. E. Roberts will defend.

Among the attorneys present at court this week were those of our own county and Messrs. O. J. Larson and G. N. Nordberg of Minneapolis; J. W. tenoldis, Victor Lindler, J. A. Cadigan and Andrew Nelson of Duluth; J. A. Murphy of Superior, Messrs. Daggart and Manahan of St. Paul and J. N. Searles of Stillwater.

Arrested on Assault Charge
Gay and James Okerlund of Cloverton were arrested at Cloverton, Monday, on a charge of assault in the second degree. After a hearing before Justice Proffitt they were bound over to the spring grand jury and taken to Pine City where Judge Daly fixed bail at \$500 for each defendant, which was furnished and they were allowed their liberty yesterday.

Want Stock Yards or City Scales
The Chongwatana Farmers' Club is fathoming a move to secure a stock yards scale at Pine City for better satisfaction and convenience in handling the large amount of stock shipped from this point. Failing in this they will ask the village to provide a village scale and weighmaster.

Wm. Von Busch, ruler 3 Pine City, is circulating a petition among the Chongwatana farmers for this purpose and if anyone in other sections wish to aid in the work they can secure blank petitions of the same form from him.

Pine City, with an assessable value of about \$265,000, can only assess two per cent tax for general purposes—and village expenses will have to be cut below their present rate, if we understand correctly, to meet that limit. If a village scale is to be instituted it would have to be at least about self sustaining. Whether this would work out The Poker is not in a position to say.

The Rush City scales are operated 12 months of the year, the salary of the weighmaster being \$30 for 6 months and \$35 the other 6. All other expenses are about \$85 yearly. They charge 10 cent a load and the scale is a financial success for the village, we understand, netting about \$200 a year to the village treasury.

We have endeavored to secure similar information from Hercul and North Branch but have had no replies to our letters. If the information is received later it will be published next week.

SMASHING ATTACK AGAINST GERMANS

FIGHTING IS BLOODIEST OF THE ENTIRE STRUGGLE

Tentative Are Reported to Be Rushing Strong Reinforcements to Front—Kaiser Hatters to Luxembourg to Urge on Allies.

London, Sept. 28.—The allies, launching smashing attacks from their newly won positions, are keeping up their great offensive from the sea to the Vosges mountains. On the third day, however, no such spectacular success as has marked the fighting of the last two days was reported.

Berlin claims that violent counter-attacks by the French and British have been checked. Tremendous losses are reported to have been suffered by both sides.

The allies have captured more than 20 field pieces and heavy cannon, of which 12 were taken by the British. More than 3,000 Germans have been taken prisoners. Berlin reports the capture of 7,000 prisoners.

On the entire front the fighting has taken on the aspect of furious attacks and counter-attacks in which the carmine for weeks before a definite decision is reached. The fighting is the bloodiest of the entire war with 2,000,000 men entrenched German pits against French and British armies estimated to number 4,000,000.

The Germans are reported to be rushing strong reinforcements to the front and an Amsterdam dispatch says that Emperor William himself is rushing to Luxembourg to urge on his allies.

Attack on Entente Front. The allies are attacking on the entire front on which they are making striking successes on Saturday and Sunday. In Champagne the fighting is continual and the losses on both sides unprecedented. The German army corps has been wiped out, correspondents report, while the claim is made in Berlin that the French losses approximate 40,000.

On this front the French are withdrawing and a half mile of the German supply railroads has been captured. A bombardment of this important line is being kept up continually, hampering the movements of troops and ammunition.

MINERS ENTOMBED BY WATER

Eleven Men Killed Prisoners by Flood That Broke Through Abandoned Working.

Lansford, Pa., Sept. 28.—Eleven men, six of them Americans, employed as miners, laborers and drivers in the railroad tunnel of the Lehigh and Navigation company at Coaldean, two miles from here, were entombed shortly before noon by a sudden rush of water and mud that had broken through the roof of an abandoned working.

BULGARIA SENDS ULTIMATUM

Delivers Final Word to Serbia, Accords to Representatives to Depart.

Berlin, Sept. 28.—A dispatch from Sofia given out here by the Overseas News agency, says it is rumored that Bulgaria has sent an ultimatum to Serbia, and that the latter has abandoned hope of inducing Bulgaria to remain neutral.

DOG'S ON SLAYER'S TRAIL

Go Directly from Spot Where Colorado Politician Fell to Mine Entrance.

EXPLODES; 35 ARE KILLED

MANY BUILDINGS AT ARMORDE, OKLA., RAZED AND BURNING OIL THROUGH IN EVERY DIRECTION.

RAILROAD STATION IS SHATTERED BY SHOCK

Scores of Houses Quickly Take Fire from Flying Cloud of Main Street Buses Roaring Furnace—Women Burned Saving Children.

Armored, Okla., Sept. 28.—Between 35 and 40 persons were killed and estimated 200 others were injured during the afternoon when a 230-lb. tank car of molasses standing near the Santa Fe freight office in the business district, exploded. The terrific force of the explosion razed many buildings and threw burning oil in every direction. A few minutes later Armored was at the mercy of scores of fire which broke the fires were under control.

SLAVS MAKE TERRIFIC DRIVE

CO-OPERATE WITH ALLIES' ASSAULT IN THE WEST.

Furious Fighting Before Dvinsk Increases in Intensity—Germans Lose Heavily.

London, Sept. 28.—Violent attacks against the Austro-German lines along the big eastern battlefield indicate that the Russian forces are co-operating with the Allies' drive in the West.

Chicago Garment Workers Strike

Chicago, Sept. 28.—A strike of 15,000 garment workers was planned as a result of the refusal of the employees to grant a higher wage scale and improve conditions. Union leaders say the strike will completely tie up the industry in Chicago. Police as well as manufacturers district, as well as president of the Wholesale Tailors' association, are believed to be working to prevent the strike. W. B. Will Protect Americans

U. S. Ambassador Morgan at Constantinople was instructed to inquire into reported outrages against Americans in Bulgaria and ascertain if any victims are American citizens by birth or naturalization. So far no such inquiries have been made at Constantinople to date. American citizens have suffered, but American consular officers have been taxed and threatened with confiscation. The reported murder of two American missionaries still is under investigation.

DUAL MONARCHY NOTIFIES AMBASSADOR PENFIELD THAT IT WILL ACT AS REQUESTED BY WILSON.

Heavy Shipment of Supplies Is Not Admitted Even if It Is Exported to Countries in Alliance with Entente.

Washington, Sept. 28.—Austria has informed notified Ambassador Penfield that it will recall Dr. Dumba, the Austrian ambassador to the United States, as requested by President Wilson.

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BRITISH SHIPS AID ALLIES

FLEET CARRYING OUT TREMENDOUS FLANKING OPERATION.

Development Will Probably Prove Decisive Factor in Huge Attack—Surprise for Germans.

Paris, Sept. 28.—While the mighty struggle is proceeding on land, so far the Allies have been successful in their flanking operation is being carried out by the British fleet which has once more the advantage of the sea. This is a surprise for the Germans and another triumph for the British fleet.
