

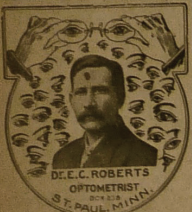

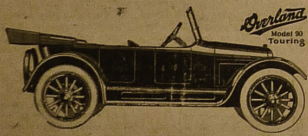

It Stands for Freedom in Accordance with Law

### GOVERNOR WILL SPEAK TONIGHT

There is a growing call over the state for Governor Burnquist to lead on in the fight that must be made in Minnesota against disloyalty and treason. It is true that the Governor has not spent his time on going about making speeches—he has had more important business to perform. The understanding at the legislature, last winter, was that Governor Burnquist was the man who wanted the law, fathered by Senator George H. Sullivan of Stillwater, providing for the creation of the State Safety Commission—and everyone knows that we have had a real safety commission in this state and that Governor Burnquist is the man who is entitled to all the credit for it. He is to speak at a big patriotic meeting at Minneapolis this evening and we shall be greatly disappointed if the loyal people of the state have any reason to feel that he does not properly sound the tocsin of defense at that gathering.

But the call of leadership is natural and right. We are in national trouble, threatened by a powerful foe from without and by sly, slinking, covert imperialism from within. We need a leader—a man whose advice shall be out in the open, clear and ringing; a man whose determination to do right shall not be warped by threats of political or personal attack; a man whose patriotism is so pure that his sole thought in this crisis shall be for his country. We need a strong, sensible, courageous and able leader. We naturally look to the Governor of our state to measure up to those standards—and we believe that Governor Burnquist will be found not wanting when he speaks this evening.

Three are some men who feel that when they get together and listen to impassioned addresses and get excited and petition the government to right all the wrongs of mankind, that they are then showing real patriotism. These aren't the first times when men have felt that way, however. In revolutionary times there were remonstrances and riots and armed resistances to a tax on whisky; during the war of 1812-14 there was rioting against the sending of the troops of this country onto foreign soil; in the times of the civil war there were remonstrances and riots against the draft of men to serve in the Federal armies. And we wonder how many men there are in this country today who are sorry that the government "stood pat" in every one of these instances and that the rioters were compelled to comply with the law.

The Duluth grocermen's picnic, last week Wednesday, was a success of the first water in weather, attendance and good time. These events will always be the big picnics of the year at Duluth as long as the grocermen can keep a man of George H. Peterson's ability and energy as their secretary. The state grocermen showed good sense in electing Mr. Peterson their secretary, also.

"Six dollars for six hours work" won't help anyone but will absolutely starve the classes who are unable to find or perform work. Conditions in the early days in Alaska, when day wages sometimes went as high as \$50 a day, are proof enough of this. The strong didn't have any more left at the end of the week but the weak were starved to death.

The "food control" administration at Washington threatens that if there is speculation in the grain market, the crops and supply will be seized. That is the best way to handle the question—the farmers will get more out of their crops

and the consuming public be better served at a lower price.

The demands of the hod carriers, miners and some other classes of labor in different parts of the country for a pay of \$6 for six hours work has weakened the position of organized labor everywhere. When a union asks for better pay at shorter hours now, the public wonders whether it is only on the way to "\$6 for six hours work."

No mother in Pine county has more reason to be proud than she whose son goes out to fight for his country and the liberty he loves in this great war.

### School Grounds Look Fine

The appearance of the school grounds here is a striking contrast with that of past years—today it presents an excellent attractive appearance and is a credit to and good advertisement for Pine City. Mr. Ayers, our agricultural instructor, deserves the credit and no man in town has done more to make our town attractive to passers by. The only reason that it is not sought every evening by scores of our own people is because of the park and lakes which are more convenient and to which people has become accustomed to turn. The improvement of the grounds was begun a year ago and have been carried on along the same lines, though more extensively. Following the general principles of landscape gardening, the decorations of flowers and shrubs have been planted along the edges, leaving large, open lawn between. 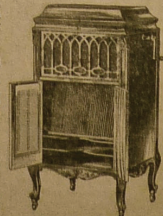

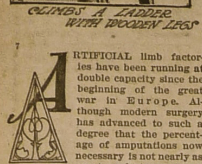

Some Birds and Their Prey  
Thrush Has Been Known to Use Stone as Slaughter Block on Which to Break Small Shells.

Even if the bird is not caught in the act, numerous small shells scattered in the neighborhood betray the place where the mollusks have been done to death. ### KEEP DAIRY PRODUCTS COOL

Importance of Act Is Emphasized by Experts at Annual Convention of Dairymen's Tank Favored.

Importance of keeping the dairy products cool during the summer months is emphasized by N. B. Olson, instructor in dairy husbandry in the Kansas State Agricultural college. A satisfactory cooler for the milk and cream can be made at a small cost.

If the milk house is near the well or hand pump all that is necessary to keep the milk cool and in good condition is a large barrel with connections from the pump to the tank. A coal oil barrel, dented by burning, will answer the purpose. The inlet pipe from the pump should rise near the bottom and the outlet pipe near the top of the barrel. This should lead to the tank tank.

The cans may be hung in the water to keep the milk cool. The milk is well below the surface of the water. It is necessary, however, to stir the contents of the cans so the milk and cream will be evenly cooled. Thick cream should be stirred every 15 minutes for half hour to two hours. The new cream should be cooled before it is mixed with the old cream.

Farmers who are building new milk houses will find it convenient to build the cooling tank of concrete. In the opinion of Mr. Olson, a tank may be set two feet in the ground and 18 to 24 inches above the ground. It is not necessary for the tank to be pumped continuously in order to keep the dairy products cool enough with this arrangement. If the tank is pumped every few days they will keep.
