## U. S. Envoys to the "Central Powers"



President Harding has sent to the senate the nomination of those whom he has chosen to represent the United States at the capitals of Germany, Austria, and Hungary—the former central powers—with which diplomatic relations were broken into by the United States entered the war.

To be ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentiary to Germany, Albert Henry Washburn of Massachusetts.

To be envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to Austria-Hungary, Charles L. Dingley of Chicago.

Before the war the dual monarchy of Austria-Hungary had an ambassador at Washington and we had an ambassador at the capital of Vienna. As a result of the war Austria-Hungary has been split into the two nations of Austria and Hungary, neither of which is considered large enough to warrant the appointment of ambassadors. Consequently the American diplomatic establishments at Vienna and Budapest will be in charge of ministers, not ambassadors.

"This is toward the end of a perfect day. We were kept busy answering telephone calls until past midnight, and were at it again at 7:30 o'clock this morning. Before noon we had visits from at least 30 photographers, including various moving picture men. Then came two scores newspaper writers for special interviews. Telegrams have been pouring in from all parts of the country begging her to visit various towns to lecture and receive complimentary addresses."

Mrs. Asquith does not look anything like so angular as the caricatures make her. She has a magnetic personality, an air of distinction and remarkable grace and self-possession.

Where Busy Readers Will Find News From All Parts of State Tarely Chronicled for Their Benefit.

**Anoka**—The Anoka County Farm bureau had its annual banquet here. The bad weather cut the attendance down to about 200.

**Balaton**—Louis P. Shogren has just celebrated her 103d birthday an anniversary Mrs. Shogren is the oldest person in this part of the state.

**Luverne**—J. E. Sherman, aged 18, and A. Parts, aged 20, were held to the grand jury at the March term of court on a charge of stealing a touring car.

**Mississippi**—Judge Charles S. Jolley, of the Hennepin county district court bench, died in Boston, where he went several weeks ago for an operation.

**Brainerd**—Charles L. Peterson, chief electrician of the Northwest Paper company here, was electrocuted while working on the switchboard in the plant.

**Sleepy Eye**—William Popham, aged 23, was killed when he was caught by a falling tree while engaged in logging operations on the Woolrick farm, near here.

**Winona**—Pioneer residents to the number of 299 gathered here for the annual reunion of the Winona County Old Settlers' association, despite the unfavorable weather.

**Rushmore**—At a meeting of a majority of the stockholders of the Rushmore State bank it was decided not to consolidate the institution with the Farmers and Merchants bank.

**Rushmore**—Paul Wagon, a farmer, was attacked by a young bull and barely escaped with his life. Weiss was badly battered by the animal before he could get to a place of safety.

**Kenyon**—Whether or not Kenyon will have Sunday moving pictures shows will depend on how her citizens vote at an election, March 14. The city council has decided to put the question up to the voters at that time.

**Duluth**—Roy Holmes, 22, was smothered in a cave he and his companions had dug in a huge snowdrift near his home. A portion of the drift caved in on the boy and he had apparently straggled to his way out when overcome.

**Albert Lea**—Harry Hanson, a traveling salesman of St. Paul, was seriously injured and ten other persons were injured when a bus was running between Albert Lea and Austin rolled off the grade, plunging the occupants under the machine.

**Windom**—State Commander A. A. Van Dyke of the American Legion, Mayor George W. Leach of Minneapolis, and Major George P. Dunley of Pipestone were the guests of honor at the annual Fathers and Sons banquet held here. More than 650 persons attended.

**Minneapolis**—To keep pace with the growth of the bookkeeping industry in Minnesota, the University of Minnesota extension division will offer a course in bookkeeping at the university farm May 23 to 26, Dr. A. V. Strom, director, said. The course will include instruction and experiments in work, given by the college faculty and professional bookkeepers.

**Minneapolis**—Francis T. Hoffelinger, president of the Minnesota Civic & Commerce association, was named chairman, and Senator J. M. Hackney of St. Paul, vice chairman of the executive committee to have charge of arrangements for the Twin Cities for the National Dairy show to be held next fall. No definite date was mentioned.

**Luverne**—Lock county shipped three cars of corn to add the famous rollers in Remond. The corn was consigned to retail headquarters in Chicago, where it will be prepared and shipped into food.





Cannon, state general manager of the Minnesota State Fair, that the board of governors of the State Agricultural Society has made a new and special department for boys' and girls' club work for the fair this year. J. L. Mitchell has been appointed supervisor, and T. A. Erickson, superintendent of this department. It is likely the juniors and their exhibits will be housed in a building by themselves. The board has the matter under consideration and is expected to take favorable action.




