


WHO CONSTRUCTED THE FIRST AUTO?

AVOID FILTHY HOG SHEEDS FOR FARROWING RESULTS

Loss of Young Pigs Eliminated by Proper Precautions in Providing Good Shelter.

Unusually large litters of pigs are reported from a survey of 62 Indiana farms. Fifty-four per cent of the sows alive when farrowed did not survive long enough to be counted when the pigs were weaned.

When the sow is being milked by hand there is a continual discharging of dirt from the teats and the teats of the sow are such that her coat is almost always soiled with stable or pasture filth.

But, nevertheless, there are chances to get dirt into the milk if the operator is careless. On many farms you will see the machines carried from cow to cow with the teat cups dragging along the floor, through the soiled bedding of the stalls.

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INCREASES USE OF GASOLINE

Very Important Part of Automobile is Located Under Car and Out of Sight, and is Rarely Given Attention.

One of the parts of an automobile most neglected by many owners is the whiffler. The introduction of the large size pneumatic tire for buses in England, was helped in a way by the introduction of a whiffler spread belt that the use of these tires was dangerous.

In case of a blowout, men argued, the tremendous concussion of the cupping air would thrust the car off the roadway. This difference in height between the two sides of the tire, one side had been deflated would be so great as to threaten to overturn the motor.

Let us consider the use of the muffler. The exhaust valve opens while the burned gas is still under a pressure of from 25 to 30 pounds per square inch. If this were exhausted directly into the air the resulting noise would stir conversation in the car among everybody along the street and quickly get the driver into trouble with the police.

In the early history of the automobile mufflers were not used and everything to be ground knew when an auto was coming. As the automobiles increased in number this became a nuisance and was stopped by law.

When these small openings become clogged the exhaust gases cannot escape readily and naturally the cylinder of the engine is not cleaned at the exhaust stroke.

Mending It. An ordinary dress snap will often mend a kittle in a pinch. Put the ball of the snap through the hole. Snap the other part on the other side and then rivet with a few very light strokes of the hammer.

Sure Death for Flies. Mix in a saucer one tablespoonful each of cream, ground black pepper and brown sugar. Darken the room except for one window and in this place the sauce.

WASHINGTON COMMENT

Washington, March 30 (Capital News Service).—Attention is drawn by national legislators to the results of reactionary forces expressing themselves in attempts to make laws remedy conditions not normally touchable by legal enactments. A bill to make attendance at church compulsory, offered in the Massachusetts legislature, is pointed out as an example. The bill met a deserved fate and was promptly killed.

South Carolina has a notorious-seeking legislator who has followed in the footsteps of his Kentucky brother in proposing a bill to forbid the teaching of what he naively terms "the cult known as Darwinism." It will probably meet the same fate as was given the Kentucky bill which was lost.

Kansas there is some local excitement as to the rights of a school board or a court of law to tell a parent how long a dress she must put on her school daughter in Chey Chase, a suburb of the Nation's Capital, citizens want District of Columbia houses to wear mussels to keep them from eating the hedges! There is an active anti-blue law society engaged in combating the intentions of men who believe "thou shalt not" laws provide real morality.

All these things, it is urged in the Capital, examples of that reaction from the liberties and relaxations of war times, which try to express themselves in too drastic legal restrictions of American liberties. Earnest vigilance, it is noted, is no less the price of liberty today than before the Revolution, and only by a sane and sound judgment and moderation can the fanaticism of the blue ad vocate be held in check.





One Solid Year of Achievement

Republican Administration's Program of Construction Being Fulfilled

Congress Is Industrious

Record of Accomplishments Not Excelled in Annals of Legislation

(By Rep. Simon D. Fess, (Ohio), Chairman Republican Congressional Committee.)

The World War Bequeathed to the United States, in common with every other nation gigantic debt, tremendous expenditures, burdensome taxes, disjunct economic conditions and general unrest. No previous administration since the establishment of our Government came into power with greater domestic problems demanding solution at its hands than confronted the Republican administration on March 4, 1921.

Immediately upon the inauguration of the President and his call of the special session of the Congress a program of rehabilitation was outlined and work immediately commenced to consummate it. The chief immigration was flooding the country. This increased unemployment, rendered more difficult a solution of our industrial problems, while the character of many of the immigrants was a menace to our social and political institutions. To protect American labor and American institutions against this invasion a law was enacted limiting further immigration to not more than three per cent of the national already in America.

The first necessary step toward economic readjustment was the necessary reduction of expenses and balancing of the budget. One of the earliest measures enacted by the Republican Congress was the budget law. The previous Republican Congress had enacted a budget law, but it was vetoed by President Wilson. The law was not to take effect July 1, 1921, in time to apply to the fiscal year beginning on the same date. Whatever economies have been effected by reason of the Budget Bureau since that time are to be credited to the early action of the Republican Congress in applying the law on the books which rendered the Bureau and made its operation possible.

The agricultural industry of the country was suffering in a degree which has never been equaled in its history. This important industry, which directly affects one-third of our population and indirectly affects every industrial, commercial and financial activity, was facing bankruptcy. In order to assist the farmer in this period of economic distress the Republican Congress enacted an elaborate program of agricultural rehabilitation. This program of constructive legislation in behalf of the American farmer is without parallel in the annals of American legislation. The substantial effects of this legislative program are now apparent on every hand.

Notwithstanding the Republican Congress elected in 1918 and assembled in special session in 1919 had appropriated hundreds of millions for ex-service men, the administration of these funds by the various executive agencies controlled by the Democrats had been such that the ex-service men had received a minimum of benefit from the funds. A large part of this was due to lack of co-ordination and co-operation of the various bureaus. One of the greatest pieces of constructive legislation of the Republican Congress was the consolidation of the various agencies dealing with the ex-service man under the new head of the Veterans Bureau. This assured expedition as well as fair and adequate treatment of our disabled ex-service men.

In addition to this consolidation and reorganization additional millions were appropriated for the use of the Bureau. American ex-service men of the World War have been better treated at the hands of the Republican Congress than the ex-service men of any previous war in American history and better treated than the ex-service men of any other nation engaged in the World War. And this is not yet. As an aid to the agricultural sections and as an antidote to the unemployment situation, the Congress passed at \$75,000,000 appropriation bill for the construction and maintenance of improved highways, which sum will be doubled when the provisions of the bill are complied with by the States putting up an equal sum of money. Among the numerous constructive and relief measures the Maternity Bill was enacted in response to the demand
