SOME COMEDY IN TRAGEDY OF OIL

SCANDAL INQUIRIES PROVIDE MANY A SMILE FOR PERSONS WITH A SENSE OF HUMOR.

Washington—Humor helps to save many a Washington session. There is comedy even in the tragedy of oil. Washington gets its daily smile as a third partner in the firm of Smeed & Smeed.

Perhaps never before in the history of things legislative and economic have such demagogic efforts been made to save somewhat undistinguished citizens from appearing on the witness stand. The telegrams which have passed one way or the other between Florida and Washington all connected with the attempt to save an editor from an appearance before inquirers, have been multitudinous in number, and in considerable part mystic in content. But the light of the matter per student has been lit in upon some of them and finally the world has been allowed to know that in the paraphrasing of the dispatches "Apples' meant Paul, the "Coast" meant a move or less humble editorial writer who perhaps cannot read his title clear, while "WGX" or something similar meant the attorney general of the United States.

Also there are several "Xs" to denote still unknown persons and this signpost has played its part in the daily drama. There is nothing new under either the sun or the oil lamp. A bit of description of give and take that one finds in "As You Like It" fits only the daily scene in the Senate office room whose four walls encompass the activities of the oil investigators and the witnesses, and the listening of the packed audience.

As in the Old Comedy.

Some of the witnesses have not their repuses altogether in hand, and the audience even more freely and truthfully to some of the members of the investigating committee. In the committee room day after day one comes as a starry field with the teams or the Quip Mollies, to be followed quickly as a tempest rise and tongue get beyond control, the Reply Charlis, the Reproof Valiant, the Countercheck Quarrelsome, the Lie with Circumstances and then, sadly enough, the Lie Direct.

Every morning and every evening one Washington asks another in the words of Polonius, "What do you read?"

And Clifton Hamlet responds: "Words, words, words."

One can go on a bit and say in a quotation from the greatest of the plays, "They have a plentiful lack of wit."

Washington is wondering a little bit if the country is getting tired of the oil investigation and its appointments. Perhaps not, but certain it is that Washington is getting tired of the extraneous things that are dragged by the heels into the inquiry, things which have no moral or immortal connection with oil, with industry, with inter-writing, with telegram-sending or with telephone conversations.

Going Back to 1920.

At this writing it appears that the oil investigators are to dig into the pre-convention campaign of 1920 to find something which may bore on present-day scandals or rumors of scandals.

Leonard Wood, Jr. has been subpoenaed to appear to testify. It is known about the rumor of an offer of the support of delegates in the last Republican convention and the Democrats to force Wood, in exchange for a promise to appoint the late Jake Hanson of Oklahoma to the post of secretary of the interior.

It should be said at once that the story is that General Wood instantly refused to consider such a proposal, but it seems that the desire to go into the affair is prompted by the fact that there was another story loose about the Washington streets recently to the effect that some of the Harding lieutenants in the Republican convention were offered delegates in exchange for a promise to appoint Albert B. Fall secretary of the interior. Both stories have been denied in toto and seemingly there is no truth in them, but the whole matter is to be gone into and as a result the oil proceedings probably will be prolonged until next weather comes in, and heat is likely to make oil offensive even to senatorial nostrils.

One finds himself wondering why the big room in which the oil investigation is being conducted always is packed with eager and curious auditors or rather, word-spooks or not. One witness in ten speaks so he can be heard beyond the seats of the committee. Moreover, the witnesses all have their backs to the audience. Nevertheless, day by day a crowding mass of people enter the room to sit through the long hours and apparently content if they hear only one word in ten of what is said. Virtually every line of the testimony is transcribed and printed in the daily papers, but hearing is supposedly more satisfactory than reading, so it would be if hearing were possible.

Inquiries All Summer.

Republican leaders in Washington are saying that activities along investigating lines, which they assert are intended largely for political purposes, will be continued until the end of the year, until next November because of the presumed advantage to the Democracy of keeping oil, the veterans' bureau

and some other things in the campaign highlight.

There is no denial here by Republicans that at least some of the investigations which have been ordered and are being conducted are justified, and they say that if there were being pressed only along these lines, the punishment of the guilty ones, there would be no word of criticism today from the members of the Republican party.

They charge, however, that other investigations, present and future, are and will be for political purposes only. This the Democrats say. Republican campaign managers hold that such was the case with which the Democrats' traditional Republican congressmen into acquiescence with all that was being done, that it is unquestionably the intention of the Democracy to induce the country between now and next November to believe that every department of the government from Interior to State is to be a bad way and that the doling of all high officials should be turned to the light.

The number of inquiries ordered or contemplated already is astounding. So far as some of the departments are concerned, there never has been so much as a whisper of wrongdoing, but nevertheless the feeling is here that investigations will go on until they are no longer serving either for punitive or for political purposes.

Disclosures that the G. O. P. unquestionably is true that doling which has been disclosed in the Interior department and the veterans' bureau already have hurt the Republican party. This the leaders of that party admit, and they also admit there has been no adequate effect for their troubles to come from the admissions of some Democrats formerly high in the public service that they acted as lawyers or workers-in-chief for certain men who have been brought into the highlight of oil. It is admitted that one or two Democratic presidential candidates have been put out of the running, but the Democrats claim that with this Republican achievement has stopped.

Now the Republicans say that the Democrats, having realized that the determination of President Coolidge to run the guilty to earth has injured their chances of making great headway against Republicanism generally, instantly formed a determination to start other investigations which they will lead anywhere, but simply to stir up suspicion and thus to strengthen the cause of Democracy in the coming campaign.

The Republican party as represented here in congress and out of it will be divided into two groups, one of them in congress apparently willing to love the lie and the other, Democracy may choose to deal and the other, represented by the national committee, ready to stand in the open, upright, and to hit hard.

National Committee Hits Back.

Action of the Republican national committee in its attack on the senator who is chairman of the committee investigating the oil industry, the Department of Justice apparently meets with the approval of militant Republicanism. It is true that the attack on the chairman appears in the National Republican, the organ of which is the secretary of the Republican national committee. This journal generally is recognized as the party and propaganda organ of the committee, and therefore the assault is just as direct by a committee one as if it came from Chairman Adams' office.

Republicans here in discussing the matter of the present investigations and of the apparent policy of the Democrats to force others, say that if the campaign managers of the Republican party were to follow the example of Republican senators and representatives and take things lying down, there would be no hope for party victory in the next campaign.

No inclination to take the aggressive ever has been manifest by the Republican senators. Even the example of the party managers seems to have given the senators no stomach for a fight. They sit in their seats and smile sadly. Their action has reminded one Republican here of the rhyme in the original book of nonsense about the man who resembled in the face of a cow and decided to sit on the stile and continue to smile, a procedure which he hoped might soften the heart of the cow.

GREAT PITCHERS OF PAST FORTY YEARS

Long List Is Blue-Penciled Down to Cy Young.

A writer in a magazine devoted to baseball has made a careful estimate of the comparative merits of the best known pitchers of the last forty years, and after measuring their records and their prowess, and subjecting their offerings to many tests, has blue-penciled the long list down to one shining name—the name of Denton 'Ironhorse' Young. Our own Cy Young, who is pronounced by this authority the greatest pitcher that ever lived, says the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

It would have been interesting if this investigator had carried his comparisons back to the pitchers in the still earlier days. There were plenty, then, too, although possibly not in the Cy Young class. There were pitchers who pitched all through the season, year after year. There were pitchers who had peculiar types of efficiency that were quite as strongly developed as those of the modern hurlers. Here are the names of a few of the early day pitchers, all players of note:

As a brainard of the original "Red Stockings," who went through an entire season without losing a game.

George Zettin, called "The Charm," who had a remarkable command over the sphere.

Alphonse Martin, "Philly" Martin, who was famous for his slow ball, his drops and his twisters.

Amos Cummings, who is believed to be the first professional pitcher who used a curve ball.

Brier Wolters, "the long Jerseyman," who pitched for the Cleveland "Forest City" in 1872.

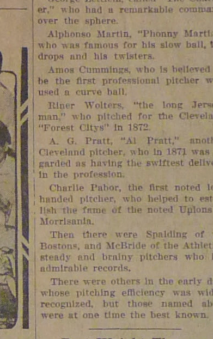
A. G. Pratt, "Al Pratt," another Cleveland pitcher, who in 1874 was regarded as having the perfect delivery in the profession.

Charlie Fabor, the first noted left-handed pitcher, who helped to establish the fame of the noted Tiptons of Morrisania.

Then there were Spalding of the Boston, and McBride of the Athletics, steady and brainy pitchers who left admirable records.

There were others in the early days who pitched with efficiency was widely recognized, but those named above were at one time the best known.

He holds the intercollegiate record with a cast of 181 feet 6 1/2 inches. With a little more seasoning and good training, which he is now receiving, he will be right on top for the Olympics at Paris this summer.

Max Carey of Pittsburgh Still Is Fleet of Foot



After 15 years on the path, that grand old vet, Max Carey of Pittsburgh, still sits in a lighter, faster foot than any youngster of them all down the track of time and baseball glory. All Max did was to steal 31 bases last year. And, added to what Max has done before, it gives him a total of 583 stolen bases for his 43 big league years of service.

It is not alone by a fast foot that Carey made his 1923 record, but also by a quick mind and a close study of the pitchers. His head helped him as much as his feet.

Carey took part in 353 games last season, which most likely is that he formed up well under his major league years. He batted only .208, but his young foot and his old head won for him a club from his mid batting average.

His outfield record also looms high in Carey's long career. He has had 497 chances out there, the record for fielders. Carey has played 1,880 games in a Pirate uniform.

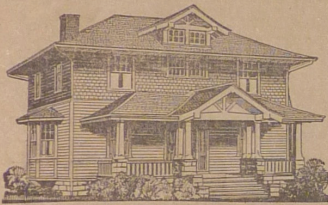

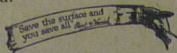

FRESH MEAT, FISH AND POULTRY NEED CARE



Housewife Should Exercise Every Precaution to Keep Foods Clean and Dry.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) The moist, cut surfaces of dressed meats, poultry, and fish offer particularly favorable conditions for the growth of micro-organisms that cause putrefaction; therefore, every precaution should be taken to keep such foods clean, cold and dry, warns a new Farmers' Bulletin, 1374, entitled "Care of Food in the Home," which may be obtained by applying to the United States Department of Agriculture.

Washing Meats Hastens Spoilage. The bulletin goes on to say that cuts of meat from the market should be unwrapped as soon as delivered, any visible dirt wiped or scrubbed off, and the meat then placed in a clean, dry, covered dish in the refrigerator or cold storeroom. Washing dries the juices from meats and hastens spoilage and should never be done until just before cooking. The curing of meats on the farm is discussed in other bulletins. The edible organs, such as liver, sweetbreads and kidneys, spoil more easily than the ordinary cuts of meat and should be handled with particular care and used promptly.

Fish loses its fresh flavor and spoils even more quickly than most meats. Since the flavor is likely to be spoiled by other foods, it should be put into the refrigerator only in a tightly-covered container. Shellfish, with the exception of the kinds held alive until used, should be kept like other sea food, as nearly ice cold as possible.

Underdone Poultry Keeps Best. For marketing, uncooked poultry generally keeps better than that from which the entrails are removed, but under home conditions poultry should generally be drawn at once after singeing and thoroughly washing to remove dirt, oil, and flakes of scarf-skin. In drawing poultry, the contents of the intestines should not be allowed to come in contact with the meat, lest it become infected with dangerous micro-organisms. The bird or the pieces into which it has been cut should be washed with clean water and wiped with a clean cloth, and kept cold until cooked.

AVOID SOGGY CRUST WHEN MAKING PIES. Partially Bake Before Adding Any Juicy Filling. (Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) In making custard pies, or those containing juicy fruits like cherries or blueberries, a soggy undercrust can be avoided if, before the filling is put in, the crust is baked for about ten minutes.
