Farberhus—The state convocation of the National Association of Statewide Fifer Men, here July 1st, will be the largest in the history of the state association, officers say.

Farberhus—The first crop of pineapples of the harvest has been planted in their trees and berry bushes, as well as in the vegetable gardens, by hives of hives.

Pipestone—Miss Ethel Fields of this city has been awarded a gold medal by a committee of the hosiery trade of Minnesota, her essay on "Stewardship" having been judged the best in a statewide contest.

Detroit—Mr and Mrs. (the Misses) of Milwaukee, S. D. were in the city for their automobiles were struck by a State car train at the White Sulphur Springs, two miles northwest of Detroit.

Moorhead—Dr. Jacob Tanner of Moorhead, Moorhead, will leave next month on a year's leave of absence for Minneapolis, where he will take up the work of a health officer.

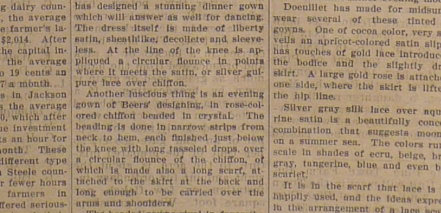

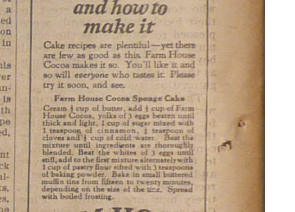

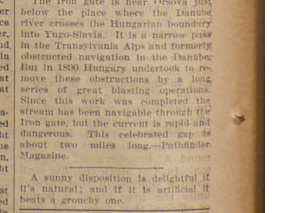

This was \$900,000,000 more than in 1922. The total includes \$10,350,000,000 for crops and \$1,900,000,000 for animal products. The value of crops fed to live stock. MARKET NEWS IS SENT OVER J. S.

Whole Country Now Included in Federal Service.

BY LEASED WIRE AND RADIO

Extension of the market news service of the United States Department of Agriculture, involving the establishment of one of the largest commercial leased telephone wire and radio telegraph systems in the world, has been announced by the Department of Agriculture. The main extension is from Kansas City to the Pacific coast, with branches to Denver, Salt Lake City and Portland, Ore. In the Southeast a branch office is to be established at Atlanta, in addition to the field stations already operating in that territory which cover the major producing district. Offices at several other Southern points are being considered.

Additional branch offices for reporting the markets on fruits and vegetables will be opened this month at Denver, Salt Lake City, Portland and Atlanta. Offices are now located at San Francisco and Los Angeles. A live stock and meats service will have additional branch offices at Denver, Salt Lake City, Portland and Atlanta. The leased wire system will run into San Francisco and the entire west coast will be effectively covered both by radio and wire telegraph from San Francisco. Final decision has not been reached as to whether radio telegraph or leased wire will be used to the Southern states.

Congress Votes Money.

Authority for extension of the department's service is contained in the appropriation voted by the last congress providing for an increase of about \$300,000 to carry on the work. Making a total appropriation of \$7,300,000. During the war the leased wire system covered over 15,000 miles and connected practically all the leading market centers of the country. The service was regarded as an important factor in bringing the war to a successful conclusion by making available at all times the fullest information on the food situation. Following the war the service was curtailed until it comprised only 2,000 miles of wire, and only a comparatively few of the large Eastern and Middle Western markets could be covered. Last September an additional circuit was started from Kansas City to Austin, Tex., with a drop at Fort Worth.

Under present extensions of the service the leased wire system will cover approximately 7,000 miles. The circuit will extend from Boston south to Washington, thence west to San Francisco or Los Angeles. En route it will connect New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, St. Joseph, Omaha, Denver and Salt Lake. Kansas City to Fort Worth and Salt Lake, Tex. Contracts will also be made by state departments of agriculture. These will include Trenton, Lancaster, Jefferson City, Mo., Sacramento and Astoria. The Southeastern district comprises reaching Richmond, Raleigh, Clemson college and Jacksonville. The leased wire circuits are in operation from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. daily except holidays and through development of code systems are more intensively used than any other leased wire system in existence. In the opinion of department telegraphers.

Controlled From Washington.

All traffic is scheduled and controlled by the Washington office and is transmitted simultaneously to all the big market centers. During the night the Washington office receives hundreds of telegrams from railroads reporting the carload movement of perishable divisions. These telegrams give the origin, destination, commodity and information is classified and tabulated and moved to all branch offices early in the next morning to show gradations in the total volume of perishable from

### MELLON PLANS TAX REFORMS

#### Treasury Chief Will Have Recommendations Ready for Next Session of Congress.

Washington—Preparations of a new Mellon plan embodying suggestions for further revisions of the tax law in accordance with President Coolidge's promise to present tax reform to supplement tax reduction already in effect.

It was indicated at the treasury that the tax experts who collaborated in the drafting of the original Mellon plan, many features of which were rejected by congress, will have new suggestions in shape for incorporation in the annual report of Secretary of Treasury A. W. Mellon, which will be submitted to congress in December.

### JEWETT RESIGNS POSITION

#### Denies Candidacy for Federal Reserve Agent—Will Return to Spokane.

Minneapolis—George C. Jewett, general manager of the American Wheat Growers Association since its organization in 1920, submitted his resignation to the board of directors.

Mr. Jewett resigns as secretary of the Federal Land bank at Spokane, a position which he held prior to his appointment in 1923 as general manager of the northwestern wheat marketing.

While in Minneapolis in connection with the meeting of the board of directors of the Wheat Growers Corporation, and a conference at St. Paul of the McNary-Haugen committee, of which he is chairman, Mr. Jewett stated that he is not an applicant for the office of Ninth district federal reserve agent, a position which he has been boomed by bankers on the Pacific coast. Mr. Jewett admitted that he has been urged to apply for the federal reserve bank post, but has decided not to become a candidate.

### 23 FILIPINOS ARE ARRESTED

#### Alleged Ringleaders in Army Clique Face Charges—Navy Yard Strike Broken.

Manila—Twenty-three alleged leaders of a secret clique formed among the Philippine Scouts to advance demands for allowances and pay equal to those given white soldiers were arrested at Fort McKinley. Eight were arrested previously.

These leaders are understood to have planned a demonstration, for Aug. 2, when they intended, military authorities tried to prevent a petition to increase pay and allowances to Governor General Leonard Wood and the commanding officer of the Philippines Department of the army.

Only about 700 of the Philippine laborers at the Cavite navy yard, who went on strike last week as a protest against wage readjustments, remain out, and these have indicated a desire to return to work, navy officials said.

### FRENCH PREMIER STANDS PAT

#### Reparations Commission Would Continue Authority Under Compromise Proposal.

Paris—A compromise plan for continuing the reparations commission in control of the execution of the Locarno plan was to be proposed to Prime Minister Macdonald of Great Britain by Premier Herriot, when the French and British premiers meet, it was stated. The reparations commission, under this arrangement, would decide whether Germany was in default, but a separate body would be created to determine whether default was voluntary.

### Suddite Found in Nile

#### Is Equivalent of Coal

New York—For centuries it has been remarked and recurring travelers relate today that a strange growth of thick weeds and sedge near the surface of the water of the Nile, above Khartoum, is responsible for the impracticability of the river at that point.

French scientists, after a painstaking investigation of this twigg, weedy, grassy, spongy, fiber-like mass called suddite, constructed first a theory that this was the sort of stuff that, under proper geological conditions, became what we recognize as coal, and they set about to prove their hypothesis.

There are 35,000 square miles of this Nile suddite. It roots about three feet beneath the surface of the river and grows to about twenty feet in height from the bed of the Nile.

Now, the first step taken by these scientists was to arrange for the transportation of the suddite to Khartoum. The natives, every three weeks, cut the mass down, tie it in faggots, make rafts of the material and float it to Khartoum. This is taken to an industrial plant and transformed into dry, compact packages.

In tests made on Nile Reamers suddite proved itself equal to coal.
