WU QUILTS WAR IN CHINA COLLAPSES

Deposed Commander Abandons Troops When Feng Starts Drive at Peking.

Peking—General Wu Pei Fu, former commander-in-chief of the Peking military forces, has fled to Tientsin, the gulf of Chihai, about 30 miles from Tientsin, it is reported at the head quarters here of General Wu Hsiang, the Christian general, who is in control here.

DR. SWENSON CALLED BY DEATH

The community was shocked last Friday morning at the finding of the body of Dr. C. R. Swenson, who took a search from one o'clock in the morning, when his clothes were found neatly placed on the bath house porch.

Dr. Swenson has been in poor health the past three months, due to a nervous breakdown from overwork in his dental office in North Branch. At that time he went to the Mound Park sanatorium in St. Paul for medical treatment and remained there five weeks. He was regaining his health, although still extremely weak, when he and his wife were in Minneapolis where he opened an office.

He drove to Pine City with his family last Thursday, coming up for a visit at the home of Mrs. Swenson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. James W. Swenson. He had been troubled with fever spells, when his body would become very hot and his pulse would race. The only relief he was able to find for the spells would be a bath in cold water. He was troubled with a cough of some kind, but he was going for a walk to get some fresh air.

He had been gone for considerable time, his folks became alarmed and a search was started as they feared an accident had occurred. It was not until one o'clock at night his body was found at the bath house and a search of the lake was then started. The lake was dragged and the body was found by James Swenson and W. H. Hodge, about one o'clock Friday morning.

Doctors who examined the remains stated death resulted from paralysis of the heart and not from drowning, and this is borne out by the fact that there was practically no water in the lungs as normally the case when death results from drowning.

Relatives are of the opinion that he had decided to take a plunge in the lake to cool his fever stricken body and the shock from the cold water proved too much for the weak condition of his heart. Corl Blanchard, who was attending the clinic at the armory Thursday night, stated he met the doctor near the armory about midnight and shook hands with him. He said that he noticed at the time he shook hands, that the doctor's face was pale.

Dr. Swenson evidently thought a bath in the lake would relieve his fever, but he never intended to take his clothes, with the exception of his underwear, and put them in a pile on the bath house porch. The condition of his body when found, would indicate that he had been stricken immediately on entering the water, so much so that he appeared perfectly natural and life like. Funeral services were held at the home of his residence last Sunday afternoon, under the auspices of the Masonic lodge of that place, of which the deceased was the Worshipful Master.

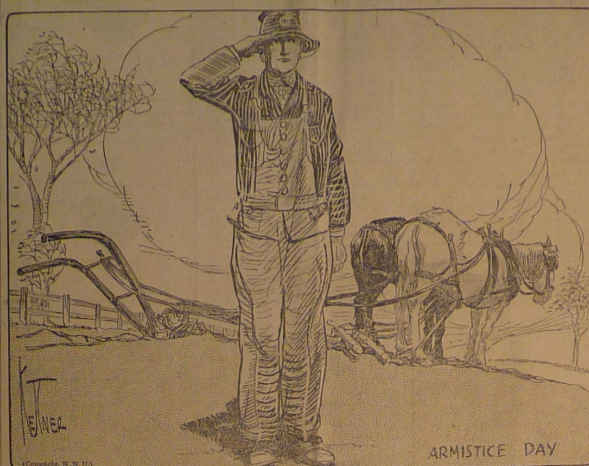

FAST GAINS PUT BLOOM ON STOCK

Cheap Gains Usually Are Slow Gains—Eight Rations Suggested for Steer Calves.

Edited by the Agricultural Extension Dept., University of Minnesota. The best ration for fattening baby calves is seldom the one which produces gains at the lowest cost...

In feeding trials at University Farm we have found that calves started on rice in the fall should gain more than two pounds per head daily in order to require a good finish and sell at a good price...

Professor Vaughan adds that the rations given below have produced satisfactory results in feeding trials at University Farm with steer calves weighing 445 to 458 pounds at the start...

- Ration No. 1.—Corn and cobmeal 10 parts, bran 10 parts, alfalfa hay 10 parts, clover hay 10 parts, linseed meal 2 1/2 parts, per head daily gain, 2.54 lbs.

- Ration No. 2.—Corn and cobmeal 30 parts, linseed meal 10 parts, bran 10 parts, clover hay 10 parts, alfalfa hay 10 parts, per head daily gain, 2.54 lbs.

BLUE HOUSE IS A PEST

It Sucks the Blood of Cattle, While the Red Louie Only Bites and Irritates.

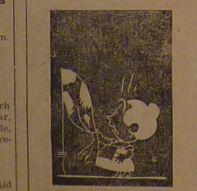
