SENATOR HENRY CABOT LODGE DEAD

Original Illness and Later Attack Were Similar to Those of Wilson.

Cambridge, Mass.—Senator Henry Cabot Lodge died at Charlestown hospital here today.

Stricken the Senator senator from Massachusetts had lingered for four and a half days when the end came.

During the latter part of the illness he lay in a state of coma but after nearly 16 hours of unconsciousness he awoke for a time to take a little nourishment and recognized persons in the room.

Never from the outset did his physical condition show any encouragement in his bulletins. They did, however, comment upon the vitality that despite his 74 years enabled him to live on for days when death was expected momentarily.

The illness that led to death was similar to that of President Wilson, the original complaint being similar and the stroke that brought on the end much the same.

Henry Cabot Lodge had served continuously in the United States Senate since 1892, as a Republican leader since August, 1915, and as one of the most prominent members of the party for a generation.

Statesman, publicist, author, lawyer and historian, Lodge's manifold activities made a wide impression on contemporaneous events.

Among the old papers was a telegram dated March 8, 1888 from D. M. Clough who was then governor of Minnesota. The telegram was addressed to the late James McLaughlin, and read as follows:

"A glove contest advertised to take place at Nickerson's between Louis Polansky and Roddy Rogan on Saturday March 12th next. Your office will be held responsible if this contest or any kind of sporting match or prize fight occurs in Pine County so that this contest is not allowed to take place. Kindly very reply have written—D. M. Clough-Gov."

Another document of interest an appointment making Sheriff Hawley a deputy sheriff of St. Louis county made out in March, 1903. This appointment was made so that Mr. Hawley could attend the hanging of a colored man by the name of Henderson at Duluth at that time. The scaffold had been constructed in the court room of the old court house corners. 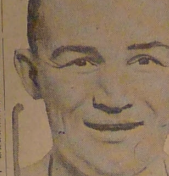

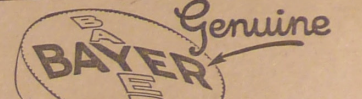

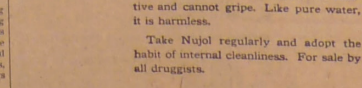
