As juniors, we presented "Going Places", our class play. "On to Hibbing" was the slogan when we won the district basketball championship. At the prom we danced in a dreamy "Stardust" atmosphere with Joanne Pehler leading the grand march. Ten seniors will never forget the huge ice-cream banana splits that initiated them into the Thespians.

Seniors at last, we again elected Joanne president. Then we went through "The Ordeal of Being Seniors"-struggling through college aptitude tests, having pictures taken, being measured for caps and gowns. For the first time we won a prize for our float-that of second place. We gave our class play, the juniors invited us to our last prom, and suddenly it was the Day of Commencement.

Now, twelve years after our first days of school, let us look at ourselves once more. We are now a larger group of larger individuals, each bound to go in a different direction through life. But we are all united by our determination that when we leave the world, it will be a better world for our having lived in it.

## What Have We Here?
