
Filings for state officials included the name of Louis Chalupsky, who was running for State Commissioner of Education.

HOMECOMING OF 49


The coronation of Queen Genell Dickinson, began the Homecoming festivities on Friday, Sertember 30, 1949.



After weeks of researching, rewording, plotting make-up, designing appropriate sketches, a final copy of the DRAGON was produced.






The Chengwatana was revived again this year after several years of inactivity. The first issue was sold late in the fall of 1949. It covered the Homecoming festivities.


Through candy sales the boys raised part of the money to finance trips to district and state contests.




JUNIOR CLASS PLAY - 1949 LET ME GROW UP

On April 28, 1950, Tom Sawyer met with his famous exploits in Mark Twain's "Adventures of Tom Sawyer,"








DECLAMATION

The chorus also participated in the annual spring festival at Sandstone.










Janet Ekdale and Donna Fohrman are co-leaders.


The majorettes have been quite active this year. On September 21, the band and majorettes went to the Golden Jubilee at Forest Lake, where they marched in the parade.

On February 18, they toured to Grantsburg and took part in the parade for the Logging Jamboree.






FOOTBALL




Setting a season record of 18 wins to 6 losses, it may well be said that the team made up for in fight what it lacked in height. The sub-district trophy was added to the collection of




