CLASS HISTORY

At 9 o'clock one September morning in 1939, thirty-two, wide-eyed, innocent little youngsters sneaked into Miss Collette's first grade room clinging to the arms of their mothers. Who was the shy little girl with the long curls and long white stockings?-No, it couldn't be, but it was-Elly Schwartzwald! Remember that darling four-way reversible dress of Jackie's that someone cut a perfect triangular hole in? And remember when Patsy was yelled at twice and still went home with the apple tree, for supposedly being the best behaved? Greta wanted to know what happened to her two front teeth-she lost them. Lewis was generous with the candy, but, ohhh-try to get a color crayon.

In our second year Miss Larson taught us the art of making butter. In the middle of the year a darling little blond boy named David, dressed in jodphurs and cowboy boots, arrived to set all our hearts a-flutter.

Miss Welna, our third grade teacher, gave us a taste of dramatics when we presented our first play. Remember that cute little pickled appendix that Lewis brought and passed around the room?

Patsy and Dave edited our first magazine under the direction of Miss West (later Mrs. Kersting) in the fourth grade. This year socialite Greta Lindquist left for a trip to South Dakota to spend the winter.

A newcomer in the fifth grade was a cute little girl with long black braids tied with big plaid ribbons (which Elly dunked in the ink because she didn't like them). Ask Mary Hady why she wore those ribbons.

Another heartbreaker, this time from Chicago, joined us in the sixth grade. Need we mention any names, Ronnie? He gave nice Christmas presents, didn't he Betty—still got your mittens? That was the year Greta was so crazy about "sports". After we were through with "Jonesy', she gave up her teaching career and settled down to a nice, quiet marriage.

Now we were in the seventh grade and were really getting places, because we had a different teacher for every class. I wonder why we always passed our history tests—could it be that Miss Just gave us all the answers? The beginning of a long, but broken romance started in the seventh grade between Elly and Dave. And how about when Ronnie and Dave broke the record by going out for cheerleading? (And did a good job of it, too.)

The "Rock Crickets" added excitement to our eighth year. Kubie got writers' cramp from writing thousand word themes every time he opened his mouth in English class. (Knowing Kubie, imagine how many he wrote!) Remember all the serious love affairs? Ronnie and Sally, Danny and Mary, Dave and Jackie, Jerry and Pat. "Rumplestiltskin" sorta came in handy when we were all learning to dance.

And then our class grew up—in more ways than one. One hundred and seven Freshmen started their high school days. The float meetings started a lot of close friendships. We'll never forget the wonderful times we had at "The Liner". Friday nights became quite a habit. That was the year we followed our basketball team to the Regional at Hibbing.

The year of 1948-49 brought us all back full of plans and a greater feeling of importance. We had a few more newcomers this year. Ella Mae Russell from St. Paul, Jim Bosson from Sweden, Charles Rike from Rush City, and Charles Roegge from Hinckley. Typing, biology and geometry added to the newness of real high school life. The mothers got together and gave us our first formal party at "The Liner" in the spring of the year.

Soon after we began our Junior year we presented a smash-hit, our Junior class play, "Little Women". "Just to be different", the girls chased the boys at a Sadie Hawkins' Day party, which broke the ice for other

school parties to follow. When Prom time came around, we were determined to exceed the efforts of our predecessors. Afterward we felt it had been a huge success and received our compliments with a greal deal of satisfaction.

And then, after years of longing and hoping, the time had come—we were at last Seniors. Betty Lou, our Senior Homecoming Queen, reigned over our undefeated football team of 1950. For the first time in our history, our float won first prize in the parade. We all celebrated our team's victory over North Branch at our first real Homecoming Dance at Pine Camp. The opening of the Dragon's Den provided and ideal place to hold parties and a hang-out for the crowd.

Other events such as the Class Play and the Prom gave all that was needed to make our year complete. And with the coming of Spring and Commencement, strains of "Pomp and Circumstance" were drifting through the evening air. The time had come. The boys had stopped playing cowboys and Indians. and the girls had put their dolls away. The boys had switched from marbles to more expensive gifts to give the girls as tokens of affection. No more rowdy Christmas parties. no more yellow conduct slips, no more high school crushes. Other Dragons will wear the green and gray. Other voices will cheer them on. And we, the Seniors of nineteen hundred and fifty-one, bid farewell to the halls of Pine City High School.



TEN YEARS FROM NOW


CO-CAPTAINS BLANCHARD AND KUBESH







Club officers are Richard Prairie, President, Russell Martinson, Vice President; William Turgeon, Secretary; Robert Kozisek, Treasurer; and Marlin Olson, Reporter.

In addition to their required classwork, the members have profited from testing milk, keeping dairy herd records, soil testing and individual farm projects.

Of great concern to the F.F.A. boys are the judging contests. The local chapter qualified for state contests in poultry, crops, wild life, dairy products, horticulture, farm management, farm beautification, farm mechanics and meats. This was their best year in the state contests. Out of the nine contests entered, Pine City captured six first places — poultry, crops, dairy products, horticulture, farm beautification, and farm mechanics; one second place — wild life; and two fourth places — farm management and meats.

A little later in the month the poultry team went to Kansas City, Kansas, for the National Poultry Judging Contest where they received honorable mention. Delbert Lange won the Silver Emblem Award. Robert Kozisek and Garland Vacinek achieved individual honorable mention.



I came from Mannheim, a large city in Southwestern Germany. My educational background includes courses in languages, agriculture, and fine arts. I attended the high school in Mannheim and also a special agriculture school.

In the spring of 1950 I was fortunate enough to be chosen to participate in an Exchange Program for agricultural student trainees. This program is a co-operative project between the U. S. High Commission for Germany, the U. S. War Department, the farm organizations of the U. S., and the International Federation of Agricultural Producers. The

purpose of the project is to give a group of selected German students an opportunity to observe and study American ways of farming and American Democracy through working on farms and attending high schools and universities. The duration of the project is one year.

My most important impressions of the U. S. are its high standard of living; its mechanization, especially in agriculture; the extreme freedom of the individual; and freedom of entrance into high school. Our schools are more difficult and the students are trained in logical thinking. I admire the extra-curricular activities, but I believe that they sometimes interfere with studies. Student opportunities which impressed me are the clean, modern building, the auditorium, the public address system, the drivers' training, the lunchroom and the Dragon's Den.
