Esther R. Dosey, Pine City, died March 26, 1989 at Lakeside Health Care Center, at the age of 94. Services were held March 28, 2 p.m. at the Swanson Funeral Chapel in Pine City with the Rev. Mary Leisman officiating. Music was provided by Organist Veona Smith and soloist Carol Ward. Daniel James Dosey, son of Julius Dosey of Pine City, passed away at the Aberdeen hospital in St. Paul last Friday, wheer he had been the past few weeks. Death was caused by heart trouble, resulting from being gassed while in the service, during the battle of the Argonne

The body was brought to Pine City last Saturday, accompanied by D B. Hesseler and S. M Niles, members of Carlton Post No. 5, Veterans of Foreign Wars, who acted as a guard of honor, and remained with their deceased commice until the remains were lowered to the last resting place in the Pine City cemetery.

A military funeral was held in the armory last Sunday afternoon attended by members of Leon Heath post in uniform. Services were conducted by Rev. Buckton. Miss Nora Wilcox sang accompanied by Mrs. McEachern. Members of the local Woodman lodge, of which the deceased was a member, attended the services. There were many floral offerings from friends and organizations, a mute testimony of the esteem in which the deceased was held.

Interment was made in the local cemetery wher the remains were laid to rest beside those of his mother, who preceded him a number of years ago. The body was borne to its last resting place by ex-service men—Robt. Wilcox, M. B. Hurteley, Clark Pennington, Wm. Challeen, C. R. Perkins and E. A. Cleaver. Taps were souned by Jos. Dufec.

"Denny" Dosey, as he was known to his many friends, was born in Pine City February 29, 1888. He grew to young manhood here and attended the local schools. He joined the regular army at Duluth in 1906, enlisting in Company I, 6th Cavalry and was stationed at Fort Yellowstone. He remained there a year, when the company was ordered to the Phillippines, and he received his discharge He worked for the telephone company in different parts of the state for a time, and was grain inspector at Sandstone for two years preceding America's entrance into the war.

He was a member of the local Naval Militia when they were called to war. He accompanied the boys to Philadelphia, later returning home, and enlisted in Company E, 7th Engineers at Fort Mayer, Va. April 4th, 1918. The company left for overseas on June 30, that year and landed in Liverpool July 8th. They reached Cherborg, France on July 10, where the company was attached to the chief engineers staff, taking care of electrical and mechanical work.

The company was a part of the First Army during its memorable advance, and was stationed at Clermont when the Armistice was signed November 11th.

The deceased had the distinction of being conductor of the first train operated by Americans to enter Germany after the war. His company discovered the train, which had been abandoned by Germans at Darmont. It consisted of 18 cars, the engine and caboose. There were enough experincd railroad men in Company E to compose two crews for the train. It was operated for a number of days by the company and reached Coblenz. Germany, December 6th.

· The company left - France for home March 9, 1919 and arrived at Newport News March 20th, the members being discharged from the service shortly after their arrival, Shortly after his return he went to Thief River Falls where he was grain inspector. He was taken sick there and went to the government hospital in St. Paul in 1920, where he spent the winter. Upo nhis discharge from the hospital, he went into the real estate business in St. Paul, and later went to work for the Northern Power Co., being stationed at Hibbing.

His health became poor last October, and he visited his father here for a few days, leaving for the hospital on October 5th, where he remained until his death.

Mr. Dosey was united in marriage to Mrs. Dora Smith, daughter of Mr, and Mrs. Buchanan of Omaha, Neb., in St. Paul, in 1914. He leaves his wife, and one adopted son, besides his father, Julius Dosey and two brothers and four sisters, William of California, Ernest of Farmington, Ida of Pine City, Julia and Esther of Virginia, Anna of Mountain Lake, Minn., and Mrs. Fred Jepsen of Ironwood, Mich., all of whom were here for the funeral with the exception of William.
