

In 1911 Iver Stumne exhibited some Indian relics he had found on his farm, Governor E. O. Eberhart spoke for more than an hour and a wedding was part of the fair entertainment. The Boy Scouts accompanied the bride and groom into the grandstand area. Mr. Arthur Wood of Willow River married Miss Gertrude May Eaton, also of Willow River.

Following the wedding the crowd was entertained by a troupe of trained dogs, cats, monkeys, apes and rats.



The new horse barn is nearly completed and is a dandy. It stands at the west end of the grounds, in line with the fine big live stock exhibit building put up a couple of years ago and the sheep and hog pens will be wheeled a ound into line with the two, cleaning out the space between them and the poultry exhibit building and improving the convenience and appearance of that part of the grounds greatly.

The Pine County Fair - 1914



Businesses in Pine City closed from 1 to 5 o'clock two days of the fair.

The big feature of the night show, the artillery battle to be staged by aBttery E of the 125th Field Artillery is a novel feature such as is rarely ever seen, and something entirely new for a county fair. Four big 3inch guns, the French 75s, will be used in the battle and close to 100 rounds of blank ammunition will be fired by the guns each night. The fair management has engaged the services of a fireworks man who has worked out a program for the battle with Capt. Jorgensen, commander of the battery, and special bombs are being made to represent the exploding of shells and to be used to the finish of the battle, for the laying over of the barage.

In 1926 an artillery battle staged by the Battery E guard group was featured as part of the grandstand entertainment. It had gone over well

Capt. Jorgensen will try to reproduce an actual scene in warfare, using the entire battery with all the equipment, including the horses with the men mounted. The battery will enter the infield in front of the grandstand and go into position for firing just as they would on a battle front. The battery will also perform in the afternoon in mounted maneuvers and fancy mounted drill and also stage a military harnessing and firing contest.

There will be a gorgeous fireworks display, both Friday and Saturday nights, following the artillery battle. A number of exceptionally good free acts will also be given in front of the grandstand, both afternoon and evenings, including a casting act by the Three Harpers, a regular state fair attraction seldom seen at county fairs.

Fireworks finished the evening.

Her singing has been the hit of many a Chicago show and she was featured in one of the Twin city theatres for three consecutive months. Every one of the girls is a clever specialty dancer. They have a variety of beautiful costumes that add greatly to the appearance of their performance.

The Miller's Jewels of 1930 was the headline grandstand attraction. It featured seven dancing women led by Miss Hazel Mack.







1931 brought The Flying Beckmans and Bassett & Bailey to town. The Flying

Beckmans had been featured with many large circuses including Barnum -

Bailey. The paper noted in particular that they traveled with baggage weighing 4,000 pounds. Bassett & Bailey hailed from London, England.


Battery E was

back with an artillery battle and Saturday's big event was a carnival dance and Mardi Gras..

The 1931 fair showed a profit and was deemed a success. Rain on Saturday cut the attendance but Friday's attendance had been greater than expected.

The sham battle staged by Battery E was a roaring success. Dynamite had been used to represent exploding shells. The sounds of battle were heard as far as Markville and North Branch. Officials from other county fairs inquired if Battery E could be available to stage a battle their fairs.

Otto Wiedemann took first place in Holsteins, Ernest Hinze second. One hundred and thirty five members of 4-H clubs had exhibits at the fair.






The big news in 1932 was this was Pine County's first "free gate." There was no admission to the grounds. There was a charge of 25¢ to park on the fairgrounds.

A wedding was the big attraction on Saturday night. Miss Grace Giese of Pine Lake married George Petry of Hinckley.

1933 was the peak of an organization called the Farmers' Holiday Association that developed as a response to the depression. Milo Reno, the national president of the organization spoke at the fair.

Once again a wedding was the big attraction on Saturday night. Miss Evangeline Wahlberg of Sandstone married Joseph Houska of Hinckley.





In 1937 instead of a wedding a wrestling show staring Pine City's own Pat Kuss was the headline event on Saturday evening.

Friday evening after the grandstand program a free motion picture on the stockyards and packing plants of the state was offered as entertainment.

The Pure Oil girl's kittenball team played a game.

A gate admission of 25\$ was being charged. Children under 16 were admitted free.


1938 was billed as the Golden Jubilee fair.

The Mpls Star covered the event and carried a front page article with photos.






1939 brought radio personalities, Cedric Adams and Clellan Card to town to act as Master of Ceremonies at the grandstand.













The grandstand program also included a number of acts that had appeared on WCCO radio.







The real excitement in 1940 was billed as "Thrill Day" and involved stunts with cars.


