To Honorable County Board of Pine County, in the State of Minnesota:

Your Petitioners respectfully represent and show:

I.—That they are the owners of the lands described after their respective signatures hereto, and that said lands so owned by your petitioners will be liable to be affected by or assessed for the expense of the establishment, construction and improvement of the State Rural Highway hereinafter described.

II.—That the establishment, construction and improvement and each of the same, of such highway, will be a public benefit and will promote the public health, and that the necessity therefor is as follows: To secure a Trunk Line Road; Assist in the Development of Eastern Minnesota and place us in touch [other than by railroad] with the principal markets of the state.

III.—That your petitioners desire to have such State Rural Highway established, constructed and improved, including all necessary ditches, drains, culverts and bridges in the following manner:

Maximum grades 5 per cent. Width of roadway [standard] 20 feet. Surfacing to a width of... feet. Earth road in accordance with the standard specifications of the State Highway Commission for roads of that character, and for bridges and culverts of the character required.
